CATHOLIC VOTING RIGHTS AND CATHOLIC SCHOOLS:

Archbishop Leo Cushley writes:

'The Catholic Church and others presently have the right in Scotland to sit in the Council education committees and to vote on matters affecting our Catholic schools. On 22 August, the City of Edinburgh Council is to vote on a Green Party motion to remove those voting rights. If this motion is carried it will pose a serious threat to the Church's capacity to influence decisions regarding Catholic education and Catholic Schools in the City of Edinburgh. I would therefore ask you to contact your local councillors as a matter of urgency to vote against this motion. Write to your councillor soon: to facilitate a numerous response, a template letter will be available on postcards at all Masses this weekend. With thanks and every blessing.' Fr Jock writes: ‘Every year, priests are encouraged/instructed to step back and take a week or so on retreat in order to get back in touch with the Lord of their work, rather than get consumed by and with the work itself...it’s seventeen months since my last retreat so on Tuesday, I set off for six days in the village of Trosly-Breuil, 50 miles north of Paris, and La Ferme, the Retreat Centre at the heart of the founding L’Arche community, where Jean Vanier lived for nearly 55 years before his death early in May this year. I have visited the community at Trosly over 20 times since first going there in 1992, and it is very much one of my spiritual homes - and sources of inspiration. It will be a particular opportunity to reflect on Jean Vanier, his life and work, and all I have learnt from him – so I would be very grateful for your prayers that it be a fruitful few days...meanwhile, **Fr Jim Smith** will kindly be covering the weekday Masses, and similarly **Fr Ian Wilson** and **Fr Paul Graham** of the Augustinian Community in Sighthill will be covering next weekend’s Masses. ‘

A REFLECTION BY BERNARD TRAYNOR ON LAST SUNDAY'S GOSPEL OF MARTHA AND MARY (Luke 10:38-42)

'More than 40 years ago I lived with a real life "Martha and Mary". I can give them their real names for they are long dead and, I believe, in Heaven: Tom and Mabel. Mabel was housekeeper, a childhood polio sufferer, unsteady on her legs, but steel-like in her resolve - whatever the task in hand. She lived in - and in return for her board and keep, diligently managed the house and kitchen. I never saw her read a book though she did possess a well-worn Missal full of prayer-cards, Novena-cards and the like. She was entrenched in her views on just about everything. So, for example, all meat was served in a state of near cremation, vegetables with all of the texture of blancmange would be plonked onto the plate and custard with a skin thick enough to sole a shoe would be served with all manner of pudding and tinned fruit. Once, after weeks of negotiation, I was allowed to prepare my own steak. "You can't eat that, it will kill you! Look, you can see the blood!" "I know", I replied, "that's the way I like it!" As I type this reflection, I'm conscious that her dire prediction failed to materialise.... and the steak was delicious. Despite her culinary style, she had a large heart and was driven by a desire to serve. Tom was the parish priest. He crafted a weekly sermon that people travelled miles to hear. He would start on a Monday, carefully studying the readings for the following Sunday and his scrawled notes would litter his desk until Thursday when battle commenced with an aged Remington typewriter. This machine was possessed by some sort of gremlin: the carriage return would prove a match to Arkwright's till-drawer in lethal potential. Every sermon Tom ever delivered was carefully filed and often when insight was in short supply he would seek some spark or inspiration from previous compositions. They served as a living witness to his thought development and spiritual journey in much the same way as our teenage diaries show our life's journey. He would spend hours making sure that the sermon to be delivered had a beginning, a middle and an end and was worthy of both the gospel and the congregation. His sermon-writing responsibility was of paramount importance and everything else took second place. He had a fixed routine in life and woe betide any who interfered with that routine. He had a complete inability to disguise his irritation or frustration - but you knew where you stood. Mabel had known him for years and was fiercely loyal but she kept one secret from him.... and I was complicit.

In those days you hardly ever saw anyone sleeping in shop doorways but there were a number of itinerants: 'Gentlemen of the road' as they were referred to. One such was a regular visitor and in return for a sandwich and a cup of tea he would do a spot of weeding or litter picking or leaf sweeping. Mabel would often smuggle him into an outhouse where she would put clean bedding, towels and warm water and then rise early next morning to prepare a breakfast and then send him on his way before Tom was up and about - or any the wiser. If ever she was away overnight, I was given my instructions, and sworn to secrecy. "It was to be our secret" and the price to be paid for the freedom to prepare my own steak! She lived the Christian life of service. Looking back I don't think Tom would have had any concerns save that of her own safety but she couldn't take the risk that the gentleman of the road would be rejected.

Martha and Mary, Mabel and Tom. The Church has long had a rich tradition of contemplative orders but equally has need for those who would polish the brass, staff the soup kitchens, prepare the altar linen, nurse the sick and till the land. I once stayed at Clervaux Abbey in Luxembourg and was always inspired by the sight of the monks clomping in from the fields and washing face and hands before filing into the Abbey Church to sing "psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God" (Eph 5:19). WE need our time of reflective prayer and meditation, and we need our time for manual service. Both gladden the soul and feed the spirit. Some of us are happier with an active Christianity than we are with a meditative one. Both have worth and value - both are necessary. There is a time to be active and a time to be quiet and each has the thread of prayer running through. Martha and Mary are two of the few people ever to be named in the Gospel and will always not only be remembered but immediately conjure a picture in our minds. Their lesson is there for us all to imitate and their example is the route we take to our eternal salvation.'
