amily? I'll tell you what family means to me, says Jesus. They think he's gone mad or is, even worse, possessed by an evil spirit, because he goes beyond the understanding of the close clan mentality. It comes to something when his own family thinks he's lost it and is out of his mind.

Not just his own family, but the Jewish authorities accuse him of evil spirit possession: after all, he's been healing folk and claiming to forgive sins. And only God can do that! This is the only time in scripture that Beelzebul is mentioned, alleging that Jesus casts out evil spirits by diabolical intervention. Jesus comes back fiercely, showing them illogicality of their thinking, and

pronouncing on the unforgivable sin against the Holy Spirit.

What Jesus is doing is beginning to teach a new meaning of family, which goes beyond their accepted version. No longer does it matter about blood relationship, tribe, whatever. What matters is that anyone who does the will of the Father of Jesus is deemed by Jesus to be brother, sister, mother.

This radical fresh sense of belonging opens new avenues for us right now. So often we live with notions about insiders and outsiders. Just as Jesus broke new ground which shocked and led to serious name-calling, so if you and I dare to be different, to go beyond immediate family, colour of skin, or religion, or whatever, no doubt we'll get the same treatment as Jesus and meet with criticism and rejection. But it'll be worth that cost!

The perfect meal

Bonnie Prince Charlie and his elder brother and future cardinal, Henry Stuart, were baptised in the church of the Twelve Apostles (Ss Apostoli) in Rome.

Directly underneath the high altar, the ancient crypt enshrines the tomb of the apostles Philip and James. These early "house church" frescoes witness a deeply Christian faith that stood firm amidst brutal persecution. Who but the early Christians would recognise the picture of a patrician mother and child as Mary and Jesus in Roman dress? Is this one of the earliest representations of the Epiphany? Who else would understand and recognise the symbolism of the vine and the branches, fish, pelican and the Good Shepherd?

But wait... The Last Supper

resembles a small dinner party for only seven people. Jesus had more than six disciples. Were the persecuted early Christians secretly declaring another Eucharistic truth? Seven was a "perfect number". This meal was perfect. Jesus, set apart from his six guests, was also its centre. This was Eucharist!
