**Deacon Eddie and Fr Jock write**: 'Both of us had friends enthusing us about how powerful the initial 8 part crowd funded series was and having watched them ourselves we were equally impressed....in the final two months of the year, in near lockdown and with the nights getting longer, we'd like to suggest that between the middle of November and the middle of December, we commit ourselves to watching the first 4 (45 minutes long) parts – either individually or as part of an online small group – and then reflect on questions that will be provided for each part.

### HOW ARE WE GOING TO KEEP WARM IN OUR CHURCHES THIS WINTER?



Both of our churches have circulating warm air central heating systems.

In practice that means one hour before Mass as our welcomers, organist and audio-visual team are in attendance earlier.

It is our intention to purchase additional electric heaters in order to endeavour to keep the churches as comfortable as possible.





She spent a number of years working as Hospital Chaplain in Daisy Hill, Newry and Beaumont Hospital, Dublin. She spent the years before her retirement working as a special needs teacher in schools in Clare. She has published many short stories and poems.

From New Ross, on a fair day, my father returned home with a packet of Rolos for me. Sweets, in the heart of the country, were a rare commodity. At a very young age I had heard of "miracles". When I received my treat, I would go out to the barn, put the sweet on my tiny hand, and pray fervently to God. My eyes would open in wonder as I longingly hoped the sweet would increase. # A REFLECTION BY BERNARD TRAYNOR ON THE READINGS FOR THE FEAST OF ALL SAINTS

Apocalypse 7:2-4, 9-14

#### Matthew 5:1-12

Regularly I find myself shopping at the same time as one of the GP's from my medical practice. I have shared before that I love watching people – and whilst I avoid staring at him – I invariably steal a sideways glance into his shopping trolley. It's always reassuring to see his trolley filled with healthy options. Whilst I would feel absolved of personal culpability were my gaze to rest upon chocolate bars, crisps and the like I am heartened to see fresh fruit and veg and all manner of wholesome produce. Sometimes, before the days of COVID when Hospital waiting areas teamed with hordes of those awaiting treatment and reassurance in equal measure, our gaze would light upon a medical professional with a weight issue. Uniforms and buttons straining at the task in hand and they roll rather than walk. Suddenly our excess pounds seem not to be such a major issue. 'Physician heal thyself' trips off the tongue, sotto voce, to no-one in particular.

Today's feast, the feast of All Saints presents us with another visit to the Beatitudes, or the Sermon on the Mount. *Happy the pure in heart, happy those who hunger and thirst for what is right, happy the gentle*... It's important to remember that they are described as the Beatitudes – not the Platitudes. Platitudes are invariably spoken with a condescending air, they lack sincerity and they lack conviction. Jesus was at his most scathing when confronted by the hypocrisy of the Scribes and Pharisees and anyone who described themselves as 'Establishment.'

He has a warning for the ordinary people of his time, people like you and me, people who go through life aware that we all need guidance, that none of us have all of the answers. - he warns us to be on our guard. To beware of those who say one thing with the words that come from their mouths but something completely different with their lives. There is a section in Matthews Gospel where Jesus is quite specific. He passes judgement on the Scribes and Pharisees. *Don't be guided by anything they do for they do not practice what they preach.* We are known by our fruits. A CV might suggest to a potential employer that the next Einstein sits before the selection panel, six months into the job and the same employer realises that he has indeed bought a pup. It's easy to be lulled into a feeling of security as we imagine that Jesus' ire and condemnation is aimed fairly and squarely at the establishment. Indeed, it is – but it's not solely directed there. His advice and warning are aimed at us, too.

Turning back to the Beatitudes Jesus promises a hundredfold reward to those who are poor in sprit, those who are gentle, and the tireless followers of what is right. I can go on but that would spoil your appetite for the upcoming feast. We all need to sit somewhere quiet this weekend and read these words out loud. They are meant to be spoken; it's not blasphemous to imagine that you are sat beside Jesus. You're the reader at his Mass, if you like. He hands you the reading and he sit down beside you, smoothing the folds in his outer garment even as you clear your throat. The floor is yours. Read the words, out loud; allow them to wash over you, to drench your clothes and skin, to flow back and forth even as the tide washes the shingle on the beach. When we learn to do that and to absorb the message and to **live** the message - then we are on the way to sainthood, we are one with this weekend's feast, we are part of that huge number, impossible to count who have washed their robes white again in the blood of the lamb (First Reading)

Our example speaks much louder than anything that we might utter. We cannot condemn gossip or idle chatter if we indulge in that which we denounce; we cannot rail against those we imagine to be benefit scroungers if we support political parties and politicians who are manifestly corrupt. Let our 'yes' mean yes, and our 'no' mean no. We are called to be humble. Humility does not mean putting ourselves down – rather it means telling it as it is, with conviction and respect, whilst at the same time recognising that we cannot tell it as it is, if we're not living a life that shows we believe what we say. We are all invited to read God's word, to believe what we read – and to practice what we believe. Or, as my GP might say, we cannot encourage others to eat healthily if we're pushing a supermarket trolley laden with junk, calorie-laden food!
