Salome Reflects

Salome, one of the women who accompanied Jesus and his disciples on his journey from Galilee to Jerusalem, reflects on her experience of the past few days.

'The last two days have been such a nightmare and coming at the end of a long journey too. After Jesus had been laid in the tomb there seemed to be nothing more we could do. The Sabbath followed, a void of such emptiness and desolation: any thought of rest was impossible. Very early in the morning, before dawn, Mary, who came from Magdala, said, 'Let's go to the tomb'. We agreed at once, at least it was something to do. Clutching our jars of burial spices we crept along the city wall, a pale seam of light just visible on the eastern horizon. We kept saying to one another, 'But what about the stone?' Then, we saw it, the stone had been rolled back. At first, we were rooted to the spot with fright; we approached and cautiously looked inside and were amazed. The tomb seemed so spacious, filled with light and peace, and there was a presence, an angel, who told us Jesus had been raised. I don't know how long we spent in the tomb but when we emerged into the sunlight it was like coming into a new world: all our pain had turned to joy. Death had been truly overcome so we ran shouting, 'He is ALIVE! He is ALIVE!' to tell Peter and the all the others.

After a while some of us decided to return to our homes in Galilee but we carried within us the Good News of Jesus' resurrection. His presence now always with us, nothing could separate us from his love. This awareness is the basis of my very ordinary life, each day I seek ways to share it with those around me in joy, peace, kindness and hope in times of difficulty. The Good News is that Jesus invites everyone to participate in this way of transforming the world.' (*Mairi Clunas*)

OUR NEW PASTORAL CARE GROUP

The new Covid 19 Parish Initiative "Adopt a Friend" Has Been Successfully Launched Gary Zoltie writes: 'After a recent appeal to parishioners to support the vulnerable and those aged over 70 we have had an amazing response. We have 49 FOLK (Folk Offering Logistical Kindness) supporting 157 PIPs (Possibly Isolated Parishioners).

The PIPS were sorted into their geographical areas around the Parishes of St John's and St Mary Magdalene's and split into 8 areas from Craigentinny in the West to Eastfield in the East and everywhere else in between. We also have a group covering those who live outside the parishes. Each area has a leader whose job is to organise their FOLKs and ensure they have the resources to achieve our objectives of :-

- Regular phone contact
- Buying and delivering shopping
- Collection and delivery of medication
- Delivery of the weekly newsletter

We were aware that many of our over 70's are healthy and active and more used to giving than receiving help but we still thought it was worth making contact with them initially just in case. And obviously there are many who are older and in particular need of support at this time.

We launched the initiative last Monday and the response so far has been extremely positive with most of our PIPs really appreciating contact with their church community just over a week into the coronavirus lockdown.

Our <u>#DeDevelop</u> campaign will take the form of snapshots of the STEKA children entertaining themselves without 'costing the Earth'.

We know how hard Covid is making life for everyone, but we are especially worried about our partners, the STEKA family in Malawi, currently home to 74 young survivors of trafficking and abuse. With only 17 ventilators in its public hospitals which serve 80% of the 18 million population in Malawi, it's really important for them to keep safe and not get the virus. We don't like asking for donations because both STEKAskills and STEKA are dedicated to reducing donor dependency and promoting social entrepreneurship. This means that STEKA recently invested in equipment to be hired out for events as well as cars which are hired out to tourists. And STEKAskills was hoping to earn an income for the STEKA Centre from Dialogue Groups to be run with visiting school groups in the summer. But Covid-19 has put paid to all that. With no visitors, there'll be no profits. And STEKA desperately needs to ensure it has enough money to buy beans, rice and Nsima to eat, as well as paying essential water and electricity bills. The first post in our campaign will be of STEKA's Chancy who made his toy out of a mango stone (look online) and string because knows how to have fun without costing the earth. "Spiritual Communion"

As you are aware, in order to try to limit the spread of Covid-19, all public Masses have been suspended for the foreseeable future. This means that many people who are used to receiving Holy Communion regularly at Mass will not be able to do so for the time being.

During this "Eucharistic Fast" one way to keep close to the Lord is to make a "Spiritual Communion." This is an ancient spiritual tradition of the Church which consists in making a simple act of "spiritual communion," whereby we unite ourselves to God through prayer. It is a beautiful way to express to God our desire to be united with him when we are unable to receive Holy Communion.

The great 13th century Dominican Friar, St. Thomas Aquinas defined a Spiritual Communion as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Most Holy Sacrament [in Communion at Mass] and in lovingly embracing Him as if we had actually received Him." You can make a Spiritual Communion at communion time during a live-streamed or recorded Mass – or, indeed, whenever and wherever you like, using the prayer given below, or others like it, or your own heartfelt thoughts.

An Act of Spiritual Communion (St Alphonsus Liguori, an 18th c Southern Italian) My Jesus,

I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen. A more modern one: I wish my Lord Jesus to receive you with similar humility and devotion to that with which your holy Mother received you, and with the spirit and fervor of so many faithful Christians down through the centuries.'

The Memorare (which Archbishop Cushley is inviting us to pray each day)
