A Reflection on Sunday's Gospel (John 15: 9-17)- by Mairi Clunas

'I shall ask the Father and he will give you another Advocate, the Holy Spirit'

'In today's gospel passage Jesus speaks to use about the path of love, fidelity and sacrifice which lead to an ever deepening friendship with God – it is part of his final sharing with his disciples at the Last Supper. The scriptures offer many examples of this pattern of growth, a departure to make one's home in God. Abraham must leave all that is familiar in fidelity to God and is eventually blessed with the gift of his son, Isaac. Then there is the beautiful story of Ruth, a widow, who makes a similar journey: in fidelity to her mother in law she leaves her own native land to become a migrant worker before her marriage to Boaz. In the gospel too we see the fidelity of Mary and Joseph, of Saint John and Saint Mary Magdalene – who accompany Jesus to the end and are also first to experience the resurrection. As we grow in our life of faith and try to follow the way of *Jesus we discover that we are not alone: the Holy Spirit is given to us as a guide and support -in* prayer we open ourselves to his/her prompting, guidance and consolation. The living water promised by Jesus to the Samaritan woman. In the depths of our heart we may catch a glimpse of the 'face of God' and discover that love is always his meaning. This experience is not easy to express in words and others may sometimes be puzzled by our perseverance in the face of trials, yet we know we are not alone since God has made his home with us. Try to find some time each day to be refreshed at this source and so become more aware of the faithful friendship of the Holy Trinity.'

Thursday is the Feast of the Ascension, normally a Holiday of Obligation, and of course of Celebration too....Mass will be 'you-tubed' live at 10am and available online for the rest of the day.

(After the Ascension there begins the first and original Novena – nine days of prayer for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on us all once more at the Feast of Pentecost – Sunday 31 May.)

A Novena will be sent out by email midweek.

Geoff Dobson writes: 'I have just heard from the Scottish Ambulance Service that the St John's defibrillator has been deployed within the past 24 to 48 hrs. This is the second time that St John's defibrillator has been deployed since November. This does not necessarily mean it was used but that the SAS instructed someone to go to get it just in case.so it may have been used....

This means both defibrillators have been deployed in total three times in less than one year.

An Excerpt From a Reflection on the Eucharist during Covid 19 by Fr Andy Grayson

"...It is important that the Eucharistic celebration, that is the Mass, is not limited to the church or to the priest. We are, all of us together, a Eucharistic community and even our closed churches cannot, in any way, prevent us from living our lives as a Eucharistic People.

While it's great to have live streamed Masses broadcast into our living rooms, which helps to connect to the wider Church, it is ultimately a passive experience, as all television is. We cannot truly participate in the celebration of the Mass on TV. On the other hand however, simply being physically present at a Mass does not guarantee that a person is fully participating. We need to come to appreciate that the Mass is not something that we attend or which is given to us by the priest but an experience which we all fully participate – priest and people alike.

First of all, the Eucharist is about sharing in a meal – food and drink – bread and wine. Jesus loved to share in a meal and the Gospels are full of stories where Jesus gathers around a table to eat and drink with all kinds of people. Even living on our own we can give thanks to God for the food we eat. In the old days it was called 'grace before and after meals.' We can be particularly thankful if other people are doing our shopping for us, or in some cases cooking meals for us and bringing them to our door. St Paul reminds us in his first letter to the Corinthians '..... every time you eat the bread and drink the cup, you are proclaiming his (Jesus) death ...'

Secondly, prayer unites us, even when we pray alone. We are not really alone when we pray because the presence of Christ resides within us. That's why we never pray, even on our own, 'My Father, who are in heaven' But always 'Our Father' and 'forgive <u>us</u> our trespasses, as <u>we</u> forgive those who trespass against <u>us</u>.' It's always including other people. Praying for others and giving people a call on the telephone or through an email or even a text keeps us united in prayer. Being isolated does not mean we become passive recipients of the good will and kindness of others, but prayer makes us active members of the Body of Christ reaching out to others.

Remember St Teresa of Lisieux, (commonly known as 'the little flower') who became a nun at the age of 15 years. She died of tuberculosis 9 years later at the age of 24 years. These years were uneventful and 'ordinary'. Yet she stuck bravely to her 'little way' of simple trust and love of God and her neighbour. Her neighbours were not only the sisters in the convent with her, but she united herself with all people everywhere, especially the poor and sick. It is no wonder therefore, that the Church has made her the patron saint of missionaries. Even though she never physically left Lisieux, her loving heart reached out to the whole world in prayer. Just like the human heart pumps blood around body, so Teresa's heart of prayer was the driving force of love that flowed around the world.

In this way our own prayer, no matter how solitary it may be, is a well spring of love that reaches out to the whole world. Oh yes, indeed we are an active, engaging, and empowering Eucharistic community, which gives life to the world.'
