A MAJOR NEW FUNDRAISING INITIATIVE - TOWER TOMBOLA!

Tickets for this draw cost £10 each and can be purchased on an individual basis or in groups of two or more people.



We have an information leaflet with all the relevant details which will be sent out to each household in St John's – and to any St Mary Magdalene's parishioner who would like to receive it. (After discussion, we decided on balance that it would be worthwhile and cost effective to send out by second class post rather than as yet another email....!)

The plan is to have the monthly draw on the second Saturday of each month, with the first one being on Saturday 10 July.

Gary Zoltie, Chair of St John's Finance Council

writes: "After 18 months of planning, work commences on the church building on Monday 7th of June. Thank you very much for the continuing donations you have made for the Tower Fund, we have received a further £2,413 since last month, predominantly from the two fundraising events, the sponsorship of school dresses and the treasure hunt. A reminder that the total project cost is £352,000 and we have started with £202,000 in the bank so we have a target to raise of £150,000. In the first six months since we launched the project we

have made a wonderful start as the fundraising efforts have raised around £6,000 and we have now received

donations totalling £32,500. Whilst we have secured a loan from the Archdiocese for the full $\pounds 150,000$, all funds raised will reduce the amount that we will need to borrow.

We have applied for grants from both Historic Environment Scotland and The National Churches Trust but we still do not know yet whether these applications will be successful.

It is worth noting that the fundraising effort is being done to mitigate the large loan but the project will use up all of our existing funds and there is still a long list of other maintenance works required not only in the church building but also the hall and Parish house. It is therefore imperative that the fundraising is well supported, and your kind donations continue. I can be contacted via the Parish House if you have any questions in relation to the project itself or how best to donate.

This weekend brings news of our main initiative for the coming months – Tower Tumbola (see above) and another second collection for the tower fund - you can still donate by placing cash in an envelope and dropping off at the Parish house or by bank transfer to <u>sort code 80-46-53</u>, <u>account number 10765768</u>, <u>account name St Johns Church</u>. A REFLECTION ON TRINITY SUNDAY

For many of us, this weekend's feast of the Trinity has a sort of surreal air. We don't really understand it, but we accept it as a part of our faith. It brings comfort even if it does not lend itself, too much, to comprehension. We believe that Father, Son and Holy Spirit are three distinct persons yet one in nature. There is one God. The New Testament is rich with references to the Trinity. One that readily comes to mind is that of Paul in his greeting: *The grace of our Lord, Jesus Christ, the love of God, and fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.* In essence, belief in the Trinity, as well as bringing comfort reminds us that God is love - pure love, creative love, life-enhancing love. He is a relationship of harmony and equality, three persons yet one nature. In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus tells us what we are to do: *Go therefore, make disciples of all nations: baptise them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.* We are to share our belief and faith with everyone - the faith that speaks of love, pure, creative love: Three distinct persons, one Godhead. Three persons, distinct in nature, but not three Gods. Many have given a lifetime to studying the subject and much has been written. Their thoughts and study are available to all. We might struggle to comprehend them, opting instead to park the fruits of their labours somewhere deep in the recesses of our mind. Nevertheless, the feast has implications for our day-to-day living.

I think I have told you before about the lady who stands outside one of the local supermarkets selling copies of the Big Issue. She is Eastern European (they haven't all been booted out!) and possesses the most engaging of smiles and lively eyes. I used to find myself hurrying past her – not because I didn't want to buy a copy but mainly through embarrassment because I never carry much cash. I seem to pay for everything with plastic money. Now that shops discourage cash transactions – even car parking is contactless – I have even less need for coins. I thought she deserved an explanation for my apparent brusqueness. I stopped and explained. Her appreciation was palpable. She was grateful that I had stopped because, as she put it, 'in stopping, I acknowledged that she was there. That she existed.' I found myself going into far too much detail about my shopping habits and routine – and she kept on smiling. Hers wasn't the smile of "Oh yeah, not that one again" - it was the smile of gratitude. I had taken the time to engage with her and recognise that she was present. Just as there is evidence of all sorts of prejudice in society there is also much talk today of the issue of Racism - whether or not it is real, and whether our society suffers from institutional racism. Generalisations are always dangerous but, as a rule, 'white' people don't think that racism exists, 'people of colour' do. Be it prejudice or racism, when pressed on the subject, many resort to the defence of 'you will always find one bad apple' - and herein lies the real issue. If bad apples are in existence, what are the good ones doing about it?

Unless we are rooted in and built on the mystery of the Trinity then, when it comes to combatting the effects of these bad apples we are doomed to failure. The co-existence of three Persons in one Godhead indicate the height of the bar to which we aim. We are each made in the image and likeness of this Trinitarian God and as such are capable of and called to a life of co-existence, a life of harmony and mutual respect. There is no room for prejudice of any sort – and in moments of ruthless honesty we can see that prejudice is many faceted, a coat of many colours, and there is quite possibly one such coat that sits in our wardrobe and is a perfect fit. We might not wear it often – but we are reluctant to discard it. Like a comfort-rag it offers re-assurance and sometimes comfort.

Prejudice in any of its guises is anathema to the Doctrine of The Trinity. We possess an easy-to-follow aide-memoire in our Christian struggle. It centres around the sign of the cross that we traditionally use to begin our Mass and daily prayers. It reads: *May <u>everything I do in my life today</u>*, <u>be</u>....In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, Amen

FINDING THE HIDDEN TREASURE by Benignus O'Rourke

Chapter 20 - "The Womb of Silence"

Our response to the invitation, 'Be still and know that I am God,' is beautifully summed up in the following reflection by an unknown writer.

THE WOMB OF SILENCE



Seeds of Silence Not in the whirlwind, not in the lightning, not in the strife of tongues, or in the jangling of subtle reasoning is He to be found, but in the still small voice speaking in the womb of silence. Therefore be silent.

Let the past be silent. Let there be no vain regrets, no brooding on past failures, no bitterness, no judgment of oneself or of others. Let all be silent.

Be still and know. Be still and look. Let the eyes of the mind be closed, that you may hear what otherwise you would not hear, that you may know what otherwise you would not know.

> Abandon yourself to Him in longing love, simply, holding on to nothing but Him. So you may enter the silence of eternity and know the union of yourself with Him.

And if in the silence he does not answer, He is still there. His silence is the silence of love. Wait then in patience and in submission. It is good to wait in silence for His coming.
