

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - Luke 4: 21-30

(The author of these reflections is a friend of Fr Jock living in Northumberland)

Most mobile 'phones allow on the spot photos and videos to be taken of just about any incident. Whether it be a multi vehicle pile-up on a busy main road, or a sudden eruption of a volcano, the event will usually be followed within minutes by the images appearing on mainstream television. CCTV ensures, that when it comes to solving crime, the Police no longer rely on artists' impressions or identity parades. With 68 cameras for every 1000 inhabitants, London is the third most surveilled city in the world. They may be massively intrusive, but authorities argue they are an invaluable help in crime detection.

Despite such high levels of surveillance and the preponderance of mobile video capture capability, much of life remains hidden. On Thursday I watched video footage of lines of women in Afghanistan, displaying scars where kidneys had been removed and sold, so that they could feed their families. Then, one of these women informed us that she is being pressured into selling one of her children, to be able to feed the rest of the family. It was a heart-breaking watch. No longer can I say: 'I never realised.' I certainly cannot use the excuse: 'Nobody told me that this was about organ trade and abject poverty'. I cannot unsee the images, just as I cannot unsee the sight of desperate Afghan refugees clinging to the fuselage of a military transport craft, even as it lifted off from Kabul airport.

In last weekend's Gospel, Jesus speaking in the synagogue, announced that he had been sent to bring the good news to the poor. It's worth dwelling awhile on this idea that Jesus had been sent. Jesus is the most important figure in history and yet, he is merely a messenger. The message was bigger than even He, for the message was coming from the very core of the Godhead. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor...This weekend we begin to see the consequences of his temerity. Everyone in the synagogue was enraged and they sprang to their feet and hustled him out of the town, and they took him to the brow of a hill.... intending to throw him down the cliff. Jesus' message was unwelcome, and they didn't want him in their town. It's easy to envisage the scene. The synagogue gathering bursts out onto the street. They're pushing Jesus in front of them; there is much jeering and shouting. Other members of the town join in. Attracted by the noise, someone comes out of their house. 'What's going on?' 'They're going to throw some preacher off the cliff'. 'Who?' 'I don't know – I've only just joined in.' He's up at the front; I just hope I get there in time to see who it is, and to watch him thrown' The air is thick with dust, the noise of the crowd grows louder, blood lust is in the air. Someone falls and is trampled, temporarily making some of the crowd pause, but no-one feels compelled to go to their aid. They step over the prone body. They reach the brow of the hill. Suddenly the crowd is hushed. Silence as heavy as the preceding hysteria, descends like a thick, suffocating blanket. 'Where has he gone?' asks one: 'He's not here'. The crowd feels cheated. Their hysteria and mob instinct meant they paid no attention to the man who had stumbled and fallen. While they pushed their way up the hill, he had his breath back, allowed a few minutes for his pulse to slow and he slips way, unseen, unnoticed. Luke tells us:but he slipped through the crowd and walked away.... He still had much to say. Their blood lust might eventually be satisfied – but not today.

We are the ones who now carry the torch of Jesus' Gospel. Like Him, we too are 'sent' and, as such, we must be ready, for we also will face similar levels of antagonism, rejection, and indifference. Whenever we try to address the imbalance between those who are poor and those who are wealthy, then we know the cost. When we defend honesty and integrity in the face of deceit and deception there will only be one outcome. It was G K Chesterton who said: "The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found difficult; and left untried." This is the dilemma that faces us on an almost daily basis. Sometimes it feels as if the challenge of making Jesus' voice heard, is akin to moving the Sahara Desert one teaspoon of sand at a time. Christians in the world number 2.382 billion. Now if we give each one of those a teaspoon, just imagine what could be achieved. It's not good enough to say I didn't know, I never saw anything, nobody told me. Our response should be: How can I make a difference? If we don't even try, the task in hand becomes just a little more difficult for those who <u>are</u> willing to give it a try: our teaspoon will have to be picked up by someone else.

FINDING THE HIDDEN TREASURE by Benignus O'Rourke

(The Way of Silent Prayer, Darton, Longman & Todd LTD)

Chapter 55 – Our Reason for Living



To discover in our silent hours that we are already united with Love itself, that love is the wellspring of our lives, is to rediscover our reason for living. The realization that our deepest self is in constant union with God begins to colour all we do.

We now discover that there is no need to wear ourselves out trying to please God, to win his love. His love is given. He is a constant in our lives.

Our strenuous efforts to win his love are unnecessary.

From now on we can relax and enjoy his love. 'Enjoy

being loved at the centre of your being, 'says Augustine in his book on the Trinity (**Trinity 8.7**).

We become aware that being in the love is all that matters. In the light of this new awareness, we no longer value ourselves because of what we do. Our value is not the sum total of all we do. Our value is far greater and independent of that. What we are is what matters.

We are in union with the source of life and love. And because our life has at its center the union with one who is love itself, our deepest reality is our boundless capacity for love.

We do not try to make ourselves acceptable to God or to others by doing good things. Slowly we become aware of our union with Love and begin to live out of that love. So, our goal in life changes. Our goal is to be love. How we live now is inspired by knowing that love is our very essence.

'Love God and do what you will,' Augustine tells us. This is often misunderstood. Augustine means that if we truly love God, we shall do only what pleases him. 'Love and do what you will,' he says. 'If you hold your peace, of love hold your peace; if you cry out, of love cry out; if you correct, of love correct; if you spare, spare through love; let the root of love be within; from this root nothing can spring but what is good.'

In other words, to live in the love of God, to be aware of God's love within us, is to be freed from self-will and to will only what God wants. All we do will be good if we are centered on the awareness of our union with the God who is Love. This does not mean that our instincts cease, without a struggle, to drive us to do selfish things. But when we understand that we are love, that we are good and not evil, we will want to live a life of love.

We behave differently when we believe that our deepest instincts are not towards evil. That, deeper still, is our capacity to love. To keep in touch with that deeper instinct is the reason we devote time to silent prayer.

In our faithful attempts to be still we become aware that if we stay in contact with our deepest, truest self, and live our lives in this new awareness which comes to us in the hours of stillness, our lives will be transformed. Being tuned in to what God is doing or saying within, we allow that to be our inspiration and our guide.

We act out of what we are hearing from God within us.
