In a moment of blissful excitement, we can be easily distracted. Invariably this momentary lapse passes unobserved, and minor embarrassment may be the worst of it. Very rarely, however, but tragically, this can be the precursor of crime.

Peter, James and John were guilty of nothing more than being lost in a moment, yet they were floored by fear. Realising one's actions have damaged others takes a change of heart informed by a mixture of remorse and a desire for change. It can be a place of fear and terror. Yet it is here that Jesus says, "Stand up... do not be afraid."

In prison people seek transfiguration, complete transformation following moment in their lives when distraction was complete. This desire for rehabilitation is admirable yet often thwarted in a challenged justice system. Our thoughts about what constitutes punishment may need reassessment. In the meantime, can our prayers help them to their feet?

St Colette (1381-1447)

St Colette is the patron saint of expectant mothers, of those who long to conceive a child and of sick children.

A tradition linked to St Colette tells of a man who took his stillborn infant to the parish priest for baptism. The priest refused, pointing out that the child was dead. The man insisted. He repeatedly returned to the priest, carrying his baby. The priest became angry: "Take it to the nuns, I can't do anything for you!" The hysterical father, clutching his pathetic bundle, arrived at St Colette's house. She did a strange thing. She took off her veil and instructed the portress to tell the man to wrap his child in it and go back to the priest. When the priest saw the man return with his black-wrapped burden, he immediately protested - and then heard a faint cry from inside the veil. With trembling haste, they opened the font and baptised the now-wailing baby...
