

'A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight'.

And so it was that John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

(Mark, 1:3-5)

An Invitation to Stand with Palestinian Christians this Advent and Christmas – by not lighting the second candle on the Advent Wreath

Our fellow Christians in Bethlehem tell us that this Advent and Christmas in Bethlehem the lights that normally adorn the birthplace of Jesus will remain unlit in memory of those who have been killed in the current conflict. The Patriarchs and Heads of Churches in Jerusalem have noted that the traditional festive services in the Holy Land will be sombre in nature due to the ongoing war.

The second candle on the Advent Wreath represents **peace**, and in some traditions is known as the **'Bethlehem candle'**. This Advent, churches across the United Kingdom have been invited to do something 'out of the ordinary' **and not to light the Advent Candle on this second Sunday in Advent** (10 December) and on subsequent Sundays. ...The Old Testament lectionary reading on Sunday starts with the words **"Comfort, comfort my people says your God" (Isaiah 40:1)**. As such, it seems appropriate that we take this opportunity to think about Bethlehem and those who have been killed and those who are seeking comfort as they mourn. **This unlit candle will serve as a constant reminder that we stand in solidarity with all who are suffering in the Holy Land.** In our parishes we will be embracing this suggestion...

...and we continue to hold in our hearts those who are suffering – and all those who have lost their lives – not only in Gaza and Israel but also in the war in Ukraine, and indeed in all the wars and conflicts in our world...

‘SAINT’ OF THE WEEK – Thomas Merton

Trappist (1915-1968) – Feast Day: 10 December

"The Christian life - and especially the contemplative life - is a continual discovery of Christ in new and unexpected places."

In 1949 a surprising title made its way onto the best-seller lists. **The Seven Storey Mountain** was not a mystery or a tale of alpine adventure. It was the autobiography of a clever young man named Thomas Merton who had turned his back on the modern world to adopt the austere, medieval regime of a Trappist monk. What made the book so fascinating was that Merton appeared to be, as he described himself, *"the complete twentieth-century man."* He had enjoyed a life of freedom, excitement, and pleasure only, in the end, to reject it all as an illusion.

Merton told a story by turns funny and sad of the search for his true identity and home: of his orphaned childhood, his education in France, England, and Columbia University, of the pride and selfishness that brought nothing but unhappiness to himself and others. And he told of how his search had led him ultimately to the Catholic church and finally, on the eve of World War II, to the Trappist Abbey of Gethsemani in Kentucky in the USA. On viewing the silent monks, dressed in their white habits and kneeling in prayer in the chapel, Merton had exclaimed, "This is the true centre of America."

It was in some respects a classic tale of conversion. And yet for many readers, encountering Merton's book in the postwar years, his story struck a very contemporary note. It fed a widespread hunger for spiritual values in a world poised between war and the empty promise of *"happy days."* Suddenly Merton was the most famous monk in America. The irony was not lost on him. He had become a Trappist in part to escape the claims of ego, the anxious desire to *"be somebody."* And yet his superiors felt his writing had something to offer the world and they ordered him to keep at it. And so he did. Yet for all the books he would go on to produce, he remained firmly identified with his autobiography. It became a painful burden. *"The Seven Storey Mountain is the work of a man I never even heard of,"* he would later protest.

One aspect of the book that he particularly came to regret was the attitude of pious scorn directed at *"the world"* and its citizens. He had seemed to regard the monastery as a haven set apart from the *massa*

damnata. Only with time had he realized that *"the monastery is not an 'escape' from the world. On the contrary, by being in the monastery I take my true part in all the struggles and sufferings of the world."*

In one of his journals, he recorded a moment of mystical insight that marked a critical turning point in his life as a monk. It occurred during an errand in Louisville, *"at the corner of Fourth and Walnut, in the centre of the shopping district."*

I was suddenly overwhelmed with the realization that I loved all those people, that they were mine and I theirs, that we could not be alien to one another even though we were total strangers. It was like waking from a dream of separateness, of spurious self-isolation in a special world, the world of renunciation and supposed holiness.

Merton suddenly experienced a sense of solidarity with the human race - not simply in sin, but in grace. *"There is no way of telling people that they are all walking around shining like the sun.... There are no strangers!... The gate of heaven is everywhere."*

For years Merton had devoted creative thought to the meaning of monastic and contemplative life. But from this point on he became increasingly concerned with making connections between the monastery and the wider world. Scorn and sarcasm gave way to compassion and friendship. This was reflected in his writing. Along with the more traditional spiritual books there appeared articles on war, racism, and other issues of the day. Long before such positions were commonplace in the church, he was a prophetic voice for peace and nonviolence. In fact, his writings were so controversial that for some years he was ordered to remain silent on "political" topics. Only after the Second Vatican Council was, he freed from such censorship.

Ironically, this increasing engagement with the secular world and its problems was accompanied by an increasing attraction to an even more total life of contemplation. In 1961 he was given permission to move into a hermitage on the monastery grounds. There he continued to perfect the delicate balance between contemplative prayer and openness to the world that had become the distinctive feature of his spirituality.


Merton maintained a wide circle of friends. Many of them knew something of the tensions which at times characterized relations with his religious superiors. In the spirit of the 1960s some of them frankly questioned whether his vocation wasn't an anachronism and challenged him to *"get with it."* In fact, Merton's personal temptations were all in the direction of even greater solitude among the Carthusians or in some other remote setting. But in the end, he always returned to the conviction that his best service to the world lay in faithfulness to his monastic vocation, and that his spiritual home was at Gethsemani.

In his last years a more liberal abbot did encourage Merton to venture forth. In 1968 he accepted an invitation to address an international conference of Christian monks in Bangkok. Merton was particularly excited about the prospect of exploring his deep interest in Eastern spirituality. In this respect, as his journals show, the trip marked a new breakthrough, another encounter with the *"gate of heaven"* that is everywhere.

On December 10 he delivered his talk and afterward retired to his room for a shower and nap. There he was later found dead, apparently electrocuted by the faulty wiring of a fan. For all his restless searching he had ended exactly as he had foreseen in *The Seven Storey Mountain*. The book had concluded with a mysterious speech in the voice of God:

I will give you what you desire. I will lead you into solitude... Everything that touches you shall burn you, and you will draw your hand away in pain, until you have withdrawn yourself from all things. Then you will be all alone.... That you may become the brother of God and learn to know the Christ of the burnt men.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland...but sadly, whose internet is down today, Friday....so this is a reflection on these readings, but one written a few years ago)

On Tuesday of this week, I found myself going to a meeting in Newcastle. As is the case in most major cities, parking is a nightmare as well as being incredibly expensive – but it was a nettle that had to be grasped. Once out of the car I relied on my trusty iPhone to guide me through the streets of Newcastle from car park to meeting venue. At least that was the plan! Having used the ‘phone to establish my exact location, I asked for directions to Newgate Street. I didn’t spot the selection at the top of the screen asking me to choose between “car” “pedestrian” or “public transport”. I stared in horror at the map that materialised before my eyes. Having inadvertently chosen a route for going by car I was presented with a journey baffling in its complexity and strangely circuitous. What later turned out to be a journey on foot of one and a quarter miles taking twenty minutes was offered as a four and a half mile car journey with an estimated journey time of 35 minutes. Vaguely I remembered something from my school days – the shortest distance between two points is a straight line. Cars in cities are not allowed to follow straight lines – rather they follow the diktats of traffic managers who devise schemes designed to keep traffic moving – often with no other intention than to keep it moving!

Straight roads are much easier to follow than those that wind and twist. A straight road shortens journey time; many a bulldozer has been used to straighten country lanes, bypassing towns and villages. Explosives are used to make tunnels and cut through mountain passes, valleys are filled in to reduce gradients and make for smooth, level roads. It comes as no surprise then to hear in today’s Gospel the prophet John the Baptist, echo the words of Isaiah in the first reading “Make his paths straight!” In this instance, however, the straight highway that is called for is our pathway through life. Rarely will this be the shortest distance between two points for often our lives follow routes and roads we would rather not follow. What is important, however, is that we equip ourselves with a “straight” attitude. When Isaiah and John the Baptist urge us to “*make his paths straight*”, they are urging us to adopt a moral approach, they want us to live life as God intended. People can live next door to each other yet, because of hostility or an inability to forgive they are unable to travel the few yards that separate them.

Having a straight attitude means behaving with honesty and right living. How often have we heard, or maybe even used, the expression “You will have to straighten yourself out.”? Reformed prisoners speak of “going straight”. We are called upon to act fairly, refrain from all forms of bullying or repression, to share with those in need, to treat everyone with respect. The prophet Micah put it most succinctly when he said: “*This is what God asks of you: That you act justly, love tenderly, and walk humbly with your God.*” (Micah 6:8)

So there we have it. We can choose to walk the straight path or the crooked one. The crooked path will always be populated by those who are devious, those who cheat at every opportunity, and those who are strangers to the truth. The straight path will be populated by those who possess strength, wisdom and single-mindedness. The path followed by those who are eager to prove themselves of a straight attitude is an ascending one. The ever-expanding view, their greater depth of self-awareness and understanding more than compensates for the difficulty of the climb. The crooked path will always lead us downhill. Our appreciation of life and our view diminishes with every step. Starved of any vision or deeper understanding of life, we wither and die, a slow miserable death.

Today we can take stock and re-assess our position. We can choose our path. Let us pray that we make the right choice.
