

THE BACKGROUND TO THE NEED TO REPLACE THE GAS CENTRAL HEATING SYSTEM IN ST JOHN'S

The St John's Gas Heating System is fairly ancient – and we have known for some time that it would soon need replacing. However, the whole process has been accelerated because at the beginning of the week, we were alerted by the alarm going off that something was wrong. When **Lothian Heating**, our suppliers, came out, they discovered that the boilers were leaking gas out of faulty gas valves within the boilers themselves. These valves are now obsolete and no longer available - therefore **they recommended the system be closed down completely and the boilers be replaced.**

They also stated that new condensing boilers would have to be installed, the existing fan assisted flue system be replaced and local pipework modifications would be required.

In addition, the gas supply pipework would have to be reviewed to ensure it meets current regulations and adequate to supply new boilers.

So, we have informed the Archdiocese, and we await the appointment of a specialist consultant to advise us as to the best way forward. Once this has happened, we can then seek quotations from contractors.

Inevitably, this could take several months – we would appreciate everybody's patience and support during this difficult (and potentially cold!) period.......

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK - Raoul Wallenberg

Righteous Gentile (1912-?) – Feast Day: 20 December

"I think I may have been forgotten by Sweden, and the rest of the world.

I wonder if any of the people I saved still remember?"



Among the list of Righteous Gentiles Christians who undertook the rescue of Jews from Nazi extermination, the name of Raoul Wallenberg is the most highly honoured. Born to a life of privilege, a member of one of Sweden's most distinguished families, he volunteered in the midst of the war for a hazardous diplomatic mission in Budapest for the purpose of rescuing Hungarian Jews.

By the time he arrived in Budapest in July 1944 half a million Jews had already been deported to death camps in Poland. Additional transports were leaving every few days. Under the cover of his diplomatic status, Wallenberg immediately went to work distributing Swedish passports to Hungarian Jews. Despite the brazen audacity of his operation, he managed to browbeat the Hungarian authorities, working under the thumb of the Nazis, to respect the protected status of these "subjects" of a neutral state.

That fall the Nazis finally swept away the fiction of Hungarian autonomy and took charge of the deportations. Adolf Eichmann, Hitler's notorious overseer of the "Final Solution," was himself in Budapest. He believed that the extermination of Hungarian Jewry would be his proudest, and perhaps final, legacy. The Red Army was by this time steadily advancing. It was clear the war's end could not be far behind. Still the Nazis applied themselves to their genocidal task with single-minded devotion.

As the months passed, it seemed that Eichmann and Wallenberg were locked in a personal contest to see whether the Nazi's passion for killing would triumph over the Swede's passion for life. By this time there were over a hundred thousand Jews left in the ghetto of Budapest. Wallenberg had managed to have as many as thirty thousand of them segregated into a special preserve for "protected foreign nationals." He had become the Jews' last and only hope. He would typically appear at the train station, alerted that a shipment of Jews was heading out, bluster his way past the Nazi guards with an imperious shout, "I am Wallenberg! I insist that all Swedish citizens be removed from this transport immediately!" Before the astonished guards could react, he would hustle the children and anyone able to wave a piece of paper - a driver's license, a library card - onto his waiting trucks.

He could not save them all. But there was always the hope that by trying harder, with a bit more finagling, with a little less sleep, with a few more bribes or brash threats, he might save just one more. As the end of the war came steadily closer, the race against death became more heated. He took to reminding the Nazis and their local collaborators of the fate that awaited war criminals. It was not too late to give it up. Wallenberg put the argument to Eichmann himself over a bizarre dinner engagement not long before the end. "Your genocide plans were doomed from the start. Why not leave now, while you still can?" But Eichmann was determined to see it through to the end. "When the Russians come, I know they'll shoot me," he said. "I'm ready."

The Russian siege of Budapest began on December 8, 1944. The rest of the diplomatic corps abandoned the city. Eichmann, in fact, chose to run. But despite the dangers, Wallenberg insisted on remaining to protect "his Jews" and to oversee relief work after the armistice. He was now a man marked by the remaining Nazis; his diplomatic cover would no longer protect him. Yet he managed to survive, and with him nearly a hundred thousand Jews. For them the nightmare was over. For Wallenberg it was only the beginning.

On January 16 Wallenberg surrendered to Red Army troops and insisted on being taken to headquarters. From there he disappeared into the silence of the Soviet Gulag, one of the first casualties of the new Cold War. Apparently, the Soviets suspected that the rich Swedish capitalist, funded by overseas Jewish organizations and somehow able to manage an enormous underground operation under the noses of the Nazis, must be some kind of foreign spy. Within days Wallenberg had been conveyed to Moscow, where he was held in the infamous Lubianka Prison of the secret police.

Inquiries by the Swedish government were simply ignored. Then the Soviets claimed he had died in the battle of Budapest. Finally, in the 1950s, as pressure mounted, it was claimed that he had died of a heart attack in Soviet custody in 1947. That remained the official Soviet story. And yet reliable witnesses continued to report chance encounters with Wallenberg in prisons throughout the Soviet Union as late as the 1960s. Although he was constantly moved through the penal system and kept in careful isolation, there were occasional mistakes, an opportunity to entrust a short message to a fellow prisoner: "Tell them you met a Swede from Budapest".

The exact fate of Wallenberg remains unknown. Perhaps in his cell in a remote prison, or in a hospital, or even in a mental asylum in the company of other special prisoners, he eventually passed from this world. Under other circumstances he might well have lived to see the collapse of communism, as he had witnessed the collapse of the Nazi empire. He would have been seventy-seven in 1989. But many others lived to see that day because of his efforts, and they are only a small fraction of those who revere the name and memory of Raoul Wallenberg. Aside from the mystery of his fate there remains a deeper enigma.

Unlike many other rescuers, Wallenberg left no record of soul-searching, conversion, or even profound reflection on the meaning of his efforts. He did not come from a particularly religious family, and his privileged upbringing had fairly insulated him from much contact with suffering. He simply rose to the ethical demands of the situation as though it was the self-evident duty of a human being. He did what needed to be done. The Nazis did not know what to make of this. More than once it seems they the put the question to him: "Why would a Christian go to such trouble to save some Jews?" There is no record of his ever having dignified the question with a reply. A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT JOHN 1: 6-8, 19-24

(*The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland*)

Hello darkness, my old friend; I've come to talk with you again. Because a vision softly creeping, left its seeds while I was sleeping. And the vision that was planted in my brain, still remains, within the sound of silence.

I first 'heard' silence as a 15-year-old. I remember the day as if it was yesterday. Fitzy (as we referred to him in those enlightened days of 1968 - but whose full title was Father Felix Fitzpatrick) was a man of failings coupled with immense wisdom and kindness. He always seemed to have a new car in days when owning a car was a rarity rather than a necessity. One day he took us as a treat to listen to the silence. If we thought this idea somewhat mad, we learned that it was we who were the insane ones. We drove up above the moor at Stanhope, a small market town in County Durham. It was a beautifully still day, the sort of days that were regular features of days of yore, but which are now as rare as hen's teeth with the current cornucopia of climactic variation. He turned off the engine and we wound down the windows – winders in those days, no electric windows unless you owned a Rolls Royce Silver Shadow. We sat and listened and at first became aware of a skylark overhead with its shrill song. Sensing that she was intruding, she performed one last aria before arching away to the right and beyond. We were alone – save for the Sound of Silence. It was round about this same time that I was into my Simon and Garfunkel stage and soft rock folk music. The sound of silence became as comforting to me as my old friend, darkness. It is still just about possible to listen to silence at the top of Stanhope Moor but much more difficult to find a spot where traffic and its associated noise, does not intrude: the sound of silence is just as alluring.

The last two weeks have seen sleepless nights and my renewed friendship with both darkness and silence after my 'new knee'. Growing frustrated at my perceived lack of progress, I was reassured by trainee Kirrrsty and experienced nurse Siobhan who came on Thursday to remove my staples. Kirrrsty possessed a delightful Belfast accent and pronounced her name 'Kirrrsty' as if there would never be enough r's in the lexicon to do justice to her appellation. My knee was flaming so the apology about the coldness of her hands has never been a more welcome warning. Only the removal of the 44th staple hurt. If I thought a lollipop had been merited, my hopes were dashed as Kirrrsty, cheerfully enquired: "Shall I count them all just to be sure I haven't left anything behind?" While she counted, Siobhan explained a little more of the surgery I had recently undergone. 'Considering what you have been through, you're really making good progress.' My spirits were lifted, the long dark nights really were nights that had been spent with a dear old friend and the silence that was planted in my brain became life enhancing. It is in silence that we are closest to God; in darkness where there are absolutely no distractions, no light to lead us astray, no flashing neon lights that threaten to blind us permanently. Darkness is not bleakness. Darkness brings us to the core of our being where the absence of distraction or excuse forces us to focus on Him and Him alone.

John the Baptist knew something of the darkness of night. He slept under the night sky and once languished in Herod's gaol awaiting the whims of Salome. Tradition tells us he lived as a nomad, drawing sustenance from a diet of locusts and wild honey. Distractions were few – and in the sounds of silence and darkness of night, John the Baptist came face to face with God and, more importantly his own identity. It is within his identity that lies his dignity and true calling. It is the same for us, and that is perhaps one of the reasons we shy away from darkness and silence. We like chatter – even though the chatterers rarely share anything of substance or improve our understanding of self: they talk without speaking and they hear without listening. The other night, with only my friend 'darkness' for company, I stared for a long time at the Geminid Meteor Shower. Every year it is visible in December. It was one of those wow moments that occasionally bless us. I felt very small and could feel myself being lifted into the mystery of God and Creation. I could only think of one word: Why? How we answer that question determines so much of our life and our response to it, because it points to who we are. The Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him (John) 'Who are you?'. I am as Isaiah prophesied; a voice that cries in the wilderness. John the Baptist points us to who we are. Voices that speak of love and forgiveness to a world of hate and destruction. We know who we are because we have spent time in darkness listening to the sound of Silence.
