## SAINT OF THE WEEK

## St Margaret of Scotland (about 1045-1093) – 16 November

Margaret is one of relatively few medieval saints to have benefited from a near contemporary Life written by someone who knew her well. It was commissioned by her daughter Matilda from her confessor, Turgot, prior of Durham and then bishop of St Andrews. It conforms to the general pattern of saints' Lives, but her personality comes through. She was the youngest of four children of Edward the Atheling, son of Edmund Ironside, king of Wessex, who had taken refuge in Hungary from the Danish invaders of England. She was born probably in Hungary, and she received a good education there, developing an appreciation of beautiful books and clothes.

In 1057 Edward the Confessor, king of England from 1042 to 1066 (and saint), summoned her father back to England. He planned to make him heir to the throne of England, but Edward the Atheling died soon after arriving back there. This led to the dispute over the succession on Edward the Confessor's death, resolved by the Norman Conquest and the accession of William the Conqueror. Margaret was no longer safe in England and followed her brother to Scotland. There she was welcomed by King Malcolm III Canmore, who married her in about 1070 in the palace of Dunfermline (the capital of Scotland until 1603). They lived happily together until his death (which immediately preceded hers), and she bore him six sons and two daughters. She proved, according to Turgot's "Life of Margaret, Queen of Scotland," a civilizing influence at the somewhat rough Scottish court. She also promoted adoption of Roman practices in such matters as observance of Lent and Easter and keeping Sundays as a day of abstinence from work. She revived the monastery of lona, which had fallen into decay, and built hostels on either side of the River Forth for pilgrims to St Andrew's. She developed the priory of Dunfermline, founded by Malcolm, which became the royal burial place: it houses the tombs of twenty-two Scottish kings and queens, including Robert the Bruce.

Her life was devoted to the care of her husband, her children, and the poor, but she found time for reading and became an accomplished needlewoman. Malcolm never learned to read, but he appreciated her books as beautiful objects. (A pocket edition of the Gospels, a Life of St Cuthbert that belonged to her, and a Psalter that may have done still survive.) He was killed, with one of their younger sons, at the battle of Alnwick against William II of England.

Margaret was terminally ill when she heard the news, despite efforts to keep it from her. She accepted it as the will of God. His body was brought home, and she was buried beside him after dying on 16 November 1093. A popular cult soon developed, but it was a further century and a half — by which time canonizations were reserved to the Holy See — before Pope Innocent IV called for an inquiry into her life and miracles and canonized her in 1250. When Dunfermline was sacked by the English in 1560, her body and Malcolm's were rescued and taken to Philip II's monastery/palace of the Escorial, near Madrid. Her head had been separated, as was often done to allow more widespread veneration, and was taken first to Edinburgh and then to the English College at Douai. She was made a patron of Scotland in 1673.

**A warm welcome, once again, to Fr Jim Smith,** kindly celebrating our Masses, while **Fr Jock** is away on retreat at Ladywell Convent, near Godalming in Surrey, the mother house of the Franciscan Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood.

**Fr Jock writes**: 'Diocesan priests are encouraged to spend a full week in retreat each year, and these few days from Monday evening to the following Tuesday morning spent in solitude, meeting daily with a retreat guide, feel very necessary. (I begin the drive south on Sunday and spend that night at the house of 'my friend in Northumberland', the author of our weekly reflections). My guide at Ladywell, like last year, will be a Franciscan sister in her eighties, Sr Monica Delaney, who has been an inspiration to me ever since she was the superior of the FMDM community at my seminary in Rome, the Beda College, in the 1980's. Some parishioners might recall the moving 'Stations of the Cross for the Pandemic' that she wrote, and we used on Good Friday 2020 and 2021.

I would be very grateful for your prayers during the week - for me, the days spent each year on retreat are as important as any during the year - and will seek to hold the community of our two parishes in my heart during the time away ...'

### Nature's Silent Witness - A Short Reflection for November by Colin Davey

When Katrin and I visited Valamo Monastery in eastern Finland back in 2004, we were encouraged to view the cemetery, which lies some way out in the surrounding evergreen forest, among the finches and red squirrels. It's an otherworldly place, not least because some of the graves are covered by richly-carved wooden structures that resemble log cabins. Traditionally, these served as temporary protection for those who had died during the winter, when the ground is frozen solid. Nowadays, they dig a few (how do they decide how many?) graves in the late-summer months, while it's still warm and sunny, and fill them with pine branches, ready for any Brothers who might not make it to the spring thaw. I found this forethought both highly practical and deeply spiritual, steeped in acceptance and allegory.

# A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 33<sup>RD</sup> SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – MATTHEW 25: 14-30

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I just have too much 'stuff'. I need to do some serious work on clearing out the clutter. Last Sunday I was clearing a drawer and, in the process, came across an antique 'Waiter's Friend'. I used to collect these enthusiastically and once had a collection of more than 50, all of significant age. I thought I had given them all away. Obviously, one had survived. I opened its many arms and remembered the satisfaction to be had from making a clean cut across the plastic or foil sleeve that covered the cork, before working with the corkscrew and hinged lever to liberate the juice of oblivion. At the risk of sounding like Scrooge, I really dislike the 21<sup>st</sup> century manifestation of Christmas, for this is the time of year when my addiction and ongoing recovery presents the biggest challenges. Adverts for alcohol, and alcohol itself, are everywhere – party time is in the air, tables are groaning, jumpers garish, and fires roaring. I stared at the waiter's friend and remembered that first Port and Lemon way back in in 1962 when my dad presented the three youngest members of the family with one each. It was our special Christmas treat. More lemonade than port, it displayed an almost phosphorescent pinkness. And the taste. Oh, that taste, the warm feeling, the glow. For forty years I chased that feeling but never ever recaptured it. I would spend thousands and thousands of pounds in pursuit. I never found it but never stopped looking. It cost me friendships, respect, and reputation and if the medics at my second rehab clinic were to be believed, almost my life.

My trip down memory lane probably lasted no longer than the time taken to blink twice. It was the stuff of nightmares, and cold sweats when hairs stand to attention in a mix of fear and shame. Hurts and disappointments lunged at me from all directions. I was being assailed – and my past behaviour had provided the weaponry. My mood was not helped by the anger raging as I helplessly watch the unfolding events in the Gaza Strip. I was reminded that vengeance is not a strategy, it is delusional to believe that bombs and bullets can destroy ideas. Ideas are borne of the mind and nourished by injustice. We watch helplessly as injustice on both sides of the argument. We stop our ears, close our eyes and cry – hot salty tears, the tears that burn, they catch the throat Stop! Stop! In God's name, just stop. There have been times when the clarion cry of oblivion has repeatedly beckoned, and I have struggled.

It is so apt that this weekend's Gospel is about the Talents and the inherent mystery of the seeming injustices of life. Probably my favourite radio presenter this week posed this question of his listeners: "What do you think David Cameron would have become if he had been born of a single mother living on benefits in Sunderland?" The question caught my attention because I was born in Sunderland. I am proud of Sunderland. I know what would have happened. He would have been supported by the community: as they have always done, the people of Sunderland would step in where the State refused – just as they do the length and breadth of the UK. This is our greatest hope. People may not have a lot when compared to the richest 5% of the country – but they share what they have. They are the 'one talent-ers' but they work the talent at their disposal. I would love you to meet my friend Ali. His wife makes the most amazing humous. He sells olives and anchovies and marinated mushrooms and sweet pickled chillies and all manner of spices and marinates. Some would label him as an illegal. Recently, he earned his British citizenship. When he shared his good news a couple of weeks back, you could have seen his smile from Llandudno to Auchtermuchty. He is a grafter. Arriving with less than one talent, he has used whatever was at his disposal. I think he will be successful. He deserves to be successful just as children born in Israel and Palestine all deserve both peace and security. The question, nevertheless, causes pause for thought. Why are children in Israel born into the finest of health cares under the protection of an Iron dome, while the children on Palestine born onto rubble with missiles overhead. We are challenged to make sense of the injustice. Life is not a work of fiction, rather it is a study in facts. Life is a series of ups and downs, joys and sorrows, ambitions, and realisation. To acknowledge our individual foolishness and to recommit to the future and the span we have left. Jesus once trod the rubble of Palestine. He walks there today. He looks to us, he wonders where we are. We said we would follow him. He only gave me one talent. He gave 10 to the men and women of political import. The number is not of issue. What we do is of much more consequence. The 'Master' is not annoyed with the person who had one talent, because he only had one. He is annoyed because he didn't do anything with it. Being realistic, we can do one thing – and one thing only. We can and must repeat 'ad nauseam' that vengeance is never a successful strategy and weaponry is always powerless in eradicating an idea.
