This kingdom of heaven is everywhere: it spreads wide its branches; it grows like wheat. It is grounded in the basic soil of human lives.

"Heaven lies about us in our infancy", says the poet Wordsworth.

Yet it surrounds us throughout our lives in the fields and growing things. We must see it and nurture it. It is the sign of the enduring love of God and the hope of our salvation.

Following many years in the classroom, retired teacher and Head of RE Mary Bell now has time to enjoy the beauties of the natural world around her.

Hope is a little like leaven that expands our souls. There are difficult moments in life, but with hope the soul goes forward and looks ahead to what awaits us. Today is a day of hope.

On at least one occasion, Martha cooked whilst Mary sat and listened to Jesus. Lazarus - as a man - relaxed with Jesus and the
