

# 24 DECEMBER 2023 - FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT 25 DECEMBER 2023 - CHRISTMAS DAY



Christmas 2023



The angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin betrothed to a man named Joseph, of the House of David; and the virgin's name was Mary. He went in and said to her, 'Rejoice, so highly favoured! The Lord is with you.'

We continue to hold in our hearts those who are suffering - and all those who have lost their lives - not only in Gaza and Israel but also in the war in Ukraine, and indeed in all the wars and conflicts in our world...

Fr Jock writes: 'Just as this Advent, we have left the second candle on the Advent wreath – traditionally the Bethlehem/Peace candle – unlit, in memory of all who are suffering in Israel and Gaza... so the Crib at St John's will be different this year (at least from after the 6.00pm Christmas Eve Children's Mass). St Oscar Romero (1917-80), the martyred Archbishop of San Salvador, once wrote: 'We must not seek the child Jesus in the pretty figures of our Christmas cribs. We must seek him among the under-nourished children who have gone to bed tonight without eating, among the poor newsboys who will sleep covered with newspapers in doorways.'

One of the (horrific) features of this last year is the number of children who have died under rubble — whether as a result of earthquakes (Turkey/Syria, Marrakesh, Afghanistan, Nepal, Northern China, and several others - google 'Earthquakes in 2023') or wars (as in Gaza and Israel). So it seems sadly appropriate — and especially in the light of St Oscar Romero's words above - that the figure of St John's own baby Jesus this year lies amidst the rubble....'

'In the face of the Infant Jesus, let us see the faces of all those children who, everywhere in the world, long for peace; let us also see the faces of our sisters and brothers in war-torn parts of the world, who will experience this Christmas in the dark and cold, far from their homes due to the disruption caused by conflict.' (Prayer composed by the Canonesses of the Holy Sepulchre in Colchester and Chelmsford)

Fr Jock, Deacon Eddie, the Pastoral Team and the parishioners of our two parishes would like to welcome all visitors to our sister parishes here for the festive season, and to offer blessings – in a world sadly riven by war - for a truly peaceful Christmas and a fruitful New Year, full of Hope.

We would like to say a special thank you to all those who have so generously given of themselves and their gifts in the preparations for our celebrations – whether it has been helping prepare the churches or the liturgies, livestreaming them, assisting at them in many different ways, and in providing refreshments in the Halls after them...



Fr Jock and Deacon Eddie and the Parish House Team would also personally like to express their gratitude for the Christmas cards, gifts and good wishes they have received.

# 'SAINT' OF THE WEEK - Rabbi Abraham Heschel

Teacher and Prophet (1907-1972) – Feast Day: 23 December

"I did not ask for success; I asked for wonder. And You gave it to me."



Abraham Heschel was born in Warsaw in 1907. Descended from a long line of Hasidic rabbis, it was his destiny to take his place among them. Nevertheless, he resisted the will of his family when he chose to leave his enclosed community to explore the wisdom of the outside world. He studied philosophy in Warsaw and then at the University of Berlin, where he received a doctorate in 1933. Though he was never again at home in the Jewish ghetto, he did not dispense with his Orthodox faith. Rather, he believed it was his special vocation to connect two worlds: the mystical world of Hasidic Judaism and the modern world of "man in search of meaning."

Heschel succeeded Martin Buber in his chair at Frankfurt. But in 1938, as a foreign Jew, he was expelled from Germany and forced to return to Warsaw. He was fortunate to escape the city just weeks before the Nazi invasion in 1939. He made his way to London and eventually to the United States, where he remained for the rest of his life, teaching in a series of Jewish as well as Christian seminaries. Though he wrote relatively little about the Holocaust, his writing was deeply affected by his brush with this modern manifestation of evil. As he wrote, "I am a brand plucked from the fire, in which my people was burned to death."

Through a series of books published in the 1950s Heschel emerged as one of the significant religious voices of his time. His writings contributed greatly to the spiritual renewal of Judaism. "A Jew," he wrote, "is asked to take a leap of action rather than a leap of thought. He is asked to surpass his deeds, to do more than he understands in order to understand more than he does." But Heschel exerted an almost equal influence on Christians, so much that he was called another "apostle to the gentiles." His writings recalled Christians to their Jewish roots and their common faith in the God of Israel.

Heschel was a passionate champion of interfaith dialogue and cooperation. "No religion," he wrote, "is an island. We are all involved with one another." And "God is greater than religion." Heschel was particularly influential in challenging the Catholic Church to overcome the harmful legacy of anti-Semitism. He met with Popes John XXIII and Paul VI and was an official observer at the Second Vatican Council. There his influence was felt in the council's historic statement on the church's kinship with Judaism.

With his bushy beard and aura of holiness, Heschel gave the vivid appearance of a biblical prophet. Indeed, his study 'The Prophets' is a modern classic. He emphasized in that work that the prophet was not a fortune-teller but someone who identified with and communicated the pathos of God. In the 1960s Heschel's vocation as a prophet was tested against the challenges of war and social justice. He was a close friend of Martin Luther King, Jr., and took a prominent place in the protest against racism. He was also an early critic of the Vietnam War, noting, "To speak about God and remain silent on Vietnam is blasphemous." Explaining his engagement in political issues, he referred to the lessons he had learned from the prophets:

"that, morally speaking, there is no limit to the concern one must feel for the suffering of human beings, that indifference to evil is worse than evil itself, that in a free society, some are guilty, but all are responsible."

Faithful to his Hasidic roots, Heschel managed to communicate to a largely secular world a sense of "the holy dimension of all existence." He had a poetic knack for communicating whole volumes in a single phrase: "To pray is to dream in league with God, to envision His holy visions." Heschel's religion did not represent an escape to another world but a deep sense of responsibility to this world and its questions and needs. "We are not asked to abandon life and to say farewell to this world, but to keep the spark within aflame, and to suffer His light to reflect in our face."

He had written of the prophets that because they are ultimately motivated by love, their message often begins with denunciation but concludes with hope. This too characterized Heschel's message. Shortly before his death he taped a television interview, which he concluded with some words for young people: "Remember that there is meaning beyond absurdity. Know that every deed counts, that every word is power.... Above all, remember that you must build your life as if it were a work of art." Heschel died on December 23, 1972.

## WE'RE SORRY IF YOU'RE COLD IN ST JOHN'S BUT...

the Background to the Need to replace the Gas Central Heating System

The St John's Gas Heating System is fairly ancient – and we have known for some time that it would soon need replacing. However, the whole process has been accelerated because at the beginning of last week, we were alerted by the alarm going off that something was wrong. When **Lothian Heating**, our engineers, came out, they discovered that the boilers were leaking gas out of faulty gas valves within the boilers themselves. These valves are now obsolete and no longer available - therefore **they recommended the system be closed down completely and the boilers be replaced.** 

They also stated that new condensing boilers would have to be installed, the existing fan assisted flue system be replaced and local pipework modifications would be required.

In addition, the gas supply pipework would have to be reviewed to ensure it meets current regulations and adequate to supply new boilers.

So, we have informed the Archdiocese, and we have now appointed a specialist consultant to advise us as to the best way forward. They will be visiting us in the New Year. Once they have advised us, we can then seek quotations from contractors.

Inevitably, this could take several months – we would appreciate everybody's patience and support during this difficult (and potentially cold!) period... we have, at least, managed to buy an industrial heater nearly twice the size/power of the heater we had rented for last weekend.

# A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT – LUKE 1:26-38

(*The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland*)

Next time you find yourself gently cursing over your slow internet download speed, or the absence of decent 5G coverage, spare a thought for the NASA controllers working out of Cape Canaveral as they continue to stay in communication with Voyager 1. Launched in 1977, the Voyager 1 craft is charged with exploring the outer Solar System. She is currently fifteen billion miles away and travelling at 38,000 miles per hour. Any radio signal from earth takes 23 hours to arrive at the craft with her responses taking the same amount of time to travel back. This is frustrating for the flight control team, some of whom were born after Voyager 1 left the security of earth's atmosphere. She has three computers on board. Recently they have been sending data, that can only be seen as gibberish, back to earth. Scientist here sent messages to the craft in an attempt to re-programme the computer but must wait almost 48 hours to see whether or not thee 'solution has worked.' Not quite the recommendation that we often received from the technical helpline: : Log off, un plug the computer from the wall and wait a couple of minutes before re-booting. You just have enough time to put a kettle on. (Boil some water for tea, that is - rather than squeezing into a kettle and walking round the kitchen singing 'I'm a little teapot, short and stout! In 1977, the computers on board Voyager 1 were cutting edge. Now they are considered to have less computing power than a modern key fob that enables you to locate your car in a crowded car park, start the engine remotely, turn on the heating/defrost programme so that you never have to enter an icy car. Here in Hexham, we each have a separate key fob so that the car 'knows' which one of us is driving. Gone are the days of arguing which one forgot to slide the seat back, for having identified the driver, the fob ensures that the seat position is in the correct configuration, the rearview mirror at the right angle – and more importantly the heated seat is at the designated individual temperature. You can hear your inner Victor Meldrew complaining I don't believe it! In less than 50 years, the power held in our hands by a tiny key fob leaves us awestruck and is more powerful than the computers on board Voyager 1.

The contrast between the 'power' of that key fob versus the rudimentary computers aboard Voyager 1 are not dissimilar to the process of personal spiritual growth as we prepare for the Fourth Sunday of Advent. As primary school pupils, eager thespians in School Nativity Plays as we were, we, like St Paul, thought like a child, and spoke like a child and reasoned like a child. Now we are adults, and all childish ways are put behind us. (1 Cor 13:11). If last week's exhortation was to embrace silence, this week's is one of using that silence to explore the mystery and majesty of the Godhead. Where, last week I shared with you the "Wow" of watching the Geminid Meteor shower, this week we further deepen that understanding and desire to know more about the sheer vastness of God's creation, willed into existence from a state of nothingness so that we may look and marvel and see the God of Love, the God who chose to enter our time/space continuum as a small, giggling, burping and gurgling, helpless baby, totally dependent on the love of his very young mother and very confused 'father.' Being a man of honour, Joseph decided to divorce Mary informally' (Mattthew 1:18-25).

Whether we enjoy the faithful trust and acceptance of Mary, or the questioning doubts of Joseph, the Christmas message speaks to all. Both speak of the importance of walking with God. It's time to leave the comfort blanket of the 6-year-old and step into God's infinity. We cannot comprehend 15 billion miles or 38,000 miles per hour, but these figures barely scratch the mystery of God. Yuri Gagarin, the first man in space, in obedience to his communist masters proudly stated *I did not see God up there* when asked what his journey had been like. Perhaps he was looking as a six-year-old and not as someone who had grown in the wisdom and knowledge of God.
