The time will come when Jesus - like all children - must separate himself from his family to make his own way in life; but as a child he is wholly dependent on the love that is offered from his own family. That is the glory and the limit of his humanity.

The fact that Jesus will later leave home, gather his own disciples, travel around Galilee and Judea preaching and healing the sick, confront the religious authorities - all this is a measure of Jesus' confidence as he moves beyond the loving support of his family.

Mary, the holy Mother of God

Early Christians readily accepted Mary as the mother of Jesus, the man who was born, lived and died in Israel. After all, every human being has a mother. If Jesus was also God and Mary was his mother, then that logically made her the Mother of God. They even used the title Theotokos, which literally means "God-bearer."

In the fifth century, theologians tried to explain how Jesus could be both divine and human, immortal and mortal. If Jesus was truly God and truly human, was Mary, the human mother of Jesus, also the Mother of God? Was he one person or two inside the one body?

In 431 A.D. at the Council of Ephesus, the Church declared that Jesus was one person with a divine nature and a human nature. Mary didn't just give Jesus a human body: she gave birth to the whole person, Jesus, who was both God and man. That's why Mary is both the mother of the human Jesus and Mother of God.
