

# A CONCLAVE-ORIENTED 40 HOURS ADORATION – Quarant'Ore (Italian for '40 Hours') – WEDNESDAY FRIDAY 7-9 MAY

**Deacon Eddie writes**: 'In recent years, we have developed a 'tradition' of celebrating 40 Hours Adoration, or Quarantore, in this period of Eastertide. This year we are planning to offer a chance for all to get involved in celebrating this at the same time as the Conclave, the meeting of the Cardinals to decide our new pope, is taking place.

'40 Hours' this year offers an opportunity a chance to sit in silence before the Blessed Sacrament and quietly to pray for our loved ones and the world around us - but especially also to ask that the Holy Spirit guide the Cardinals gathered together in the Sistine Chapel as they discern who should succeed Pope Francis as Pope. .

We look to start after the 10.00am Mass on Wednesday in St Johns and continue until 10.00pm that night Then on Thursday we begin at 5.30am in St John's (a special silence usually only broken by the sound of bird song form the park next door), continuing until 9.30am. Finally, **on Friday** adoration will begin at **5.30am** and continue until **7.15pm** (with a break for Mass at 10.00am) in St John's.

## **SAINT OF THE WEEK** — **St Antoninus of Florence** Italian Archbishop (1389-1459) – Feast Day: 4 May

He conquered avarice, trampled on pride, was utterly unacquainted with lust and most abstemious in food and drink; he did not yield to anger or envy or any other passion. He was a brilliant theologian, he wrote several books which are praised by scholars; he was a popular preacher though he inveighed against sin with the utmost energy; he reformed the morals of clergy and laity and strove earnestly to settle quarrels; he did his best to clear the city of feuds; he distributed the revenues of the Church to the poor, but to his relatives and friends (unless they were very needy) he gave nothing. He used only glass and clay dishes; he wished his household (which was very small) to be contented with little and to live according to the precept of philosophy. When he died, he was given a splendid funeral. At his house was found nothing except the mule on which he used to ride and some cheap furniture: the poor had had everything else. The whole state believed that he had passed to a life of bliss—nor can we think their belief unfounded.

(Pope Pius II wrote of him in his memoirs as a tribute)



Small of stature, like Francis of Assisi and John of the Cross, but great in achievements, he was known as *"little Antonio,"* Antonino. Born Antonio Pierozzi on 1 March 1389, he was the son of a notary from Florence, named Niccolo, and his wife. He joined the Dominicans at the age of fifteen, at the convent of Santa Maria Novella, where the reformer John Dominici was prior. He served his novitiate at Cortona, where the great painter Fra Angélico (beatified in 1982; see 19 Feb.) was a novice at the same time. After his profession he joined the house at Fiesole and began his spectacular rise in the Order; he was successively prior of the Dominican houses at Cortona, Fiesole, Rome, Naples, Gaeta, Siena, and Florence, carrying through reforms in each. In Florence he engaged the architect and sculptor Michelozzi (court architect to Cosimo de Medici, the founder of the Medici dynasty and ruler of what was then the republic of Florence) to convert the former Sylvestrine monastery into the Dominican convent of San Marco. Fra Angélico painted some fifty murals in the friars' cells and in the corridors, with a magnificent Annunciation on the main staircase, so the whole building became a visual aid to devotion.

In 1446 Antoninus was consecrated archbishop of Florence by Pope Eugenius II, recommended, it is said, by Fra Angélico. He was an exemplary archbishop, personally austere in his way of life, cutting his household down to six members and virtually doing without personal possessions: everything possible was given to the poor, including the bulk of the furniture and most of his clothes. His bravery and charity during an outbreak of plague in 1448 and an earthquake in 1453 earned him the admiration and affection of his people. He carried out a visitation of his diocese every year, preaching tirelessly against such abuses as usury and magic. In 1447 Nicholas V succeeded to the papacy, and he valued Antoninus as a counsellor. In 1458 the great Renaissance scholar Aeneas Silvius Piccolomini was elected as Pope Pius II. He too appreciated Antoninus' qualities and appointed him to a commission established to reform the Roman Curia. Antoninus also enjoyed the confidence of Cosimo de Medici, who employed him as an ambassador.

In addition to his pastoral and wider church and civic activities, Antoninus was a considerable scholar in several disciplines and produced a number of significant works, including a *Summa Theologica* (reissued in 1958), a history of the world (reissued as *Chronicles* in 1933), a summary of moral theology, and several treatises on the Christian life, one of which was published in one hundred and two early printed editions. Although he preached against usury, meaning the lending of money at interest, which the Church traditionally condemned, he made an important distinction between this and the investment of capital in a business, on which he said that a moderate return was permissible. He thereby made a major contribution to the Church's adjustment to the modern financial and industrial world, in which the Republic of Florence played a pioneering part. Antoninus died in 1459 and was canonized in 1523. There is a contemporary bust of him in Santa Maria Novella, a statue in the Uffizi Gallery, and a series painted by Antonio del Pollaiuolo illustrating his life in San Marco.

# A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THETHIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER – JOHN 21: 1-19

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

*The devil is in the detail.* Apparently, most of us are not overly-diligent when it comes to reading the terms and conditions of any contract – be it banking, credit agreement, telephone contracts, holiday bookings or car-lease. I am not aware of ever having met anyone who conscientiously reads **all** of the conditions before clicking the box that says: *'I have read and accept the terms and conditions.'* We trust – and that makes providers happy. One thing is certain, the details won't be there for our benefit!

We're going on holiday for the first time since 2004. As part of our preparation, we have installed a security camera. 'You'll have to download the App' said Chris the engineer. 'Just click OK to everything'. I have no idea what I was agreeing to but if I suddenly find that I have donated a kidney, I'll know to pay more attention next time. *The devil is in the detail!* We're blessed in Northumberland with very little light pollution. A few years back I bought a basic telescope – nothing too flash but sufficiently powerful to give me enough detail to encourage me in my search for Boötes Void (pronounced Boy-ts). I have written before about this phenomenon. My philosophy lecturer taught me to love the mathematical majesty of space and introduced me to Ptolemy. It was Ptolemy who first spotted Boötes Void in the second century. 'Spotted' is a somewhat generous description. As its name suggests, it's a void - some 300 million light years in diameter. That's 300 million light years of nothing, just inky blackness – a lot of blackness and the perfect setting for me to lose myself as I contemplate the detail of this weekend's Gospel. I imagine myself sat on the edge, just staring into its interior. There's almost too much detail this weekend, as we investigate the mystery that is God, and his Son, our brother, Jesus Christ.

Let's look at some of that detail: who counted the fish? Where does the 153 come from? Why does John deem this detail so important? He could have just said 'a lot' – after all, he has already told us that the net was about to tear. Break the number 153 into its component digits: 1, 5 and 3. Cube each digit. We are left with: 1, 125 and 27. Add all three together. 'Surprise, surprise' as Cilla might say: The answer is 153. But why is John so insistent. Not 152 fish, not roughly 150, not 154. No! Its 153. The Old Testament had informed the Jewish People that when Solomon built the Temple in Jerusalem he used a work force of 153,000 men and remember, Jesus managed to annoy everyone when he said he could destroy the Tempe and re-build it in 3 days. From Good Friday to Easter Sunday – 3 days! In his Risen State, Jesus shattered the laws of physics. The *change and decay in all around that we see* is not his way. No! Jesus does do change – but he doesn't do decay, for our spirit, our souls, our psyche can never know decay: only life, eternal life in Him.

But, back to the 153. Chronologically, John's Gospel was the last to be written. At the very least he will have been aware of the works of the other evangelists. In Mark's Gospel, there are three occasions when Jesus personally blessed a total of three people. Turning to Matthew, he lists 23 separate occasions when Jesus blesses 47 different people; in Luke we find 14 occasions when Jesus blesses a total of 94 people and in John we see 8 occasions where Jesus personally blesses 9 different people. A total of 153. Is this accident, is this coincidence? We don't know. All we do know is that John must have had some reason, some meaning in mind. *The devil is in the detail.* 

The Resurrection is complete mystery. Now back to the detail. If you or I were about to jump overboard, we would divest ourselves of any heavy clothing that might hamper our ability to swim. Not Peter: John tells us that *he had practically nothing on – but wrapped a heavy cloak around himself*. The cloak will probably have been wool, guaranteed to become heavier with the water. Why this recklessness? Why this detail? So much in life can weigh us down, hampering our growth and development. Peter was possibly very fond of that cloak. It became a threat to his survival. It's all a matter of faith. 'Just Click OK to everything', advised Chris.

Personal faith is a bit like this: we click OK, the 'detail' takes us a lifetime of prayer and reflection to fathom, we do so that we may grow. Growing is all that is expected of us. When they were at a loss, the disciples sought strength in community. They went fishing together. We should resolve to do the same – not go fishing – just support one another. We are a community of believers. I might be OK this morning - but there may be someone nearby, who is struggling, someone who is not OK. Am I even aware of their need? We are a community; we draw strength from each other. We pay attention to the detail of the lives around us, and we respond to that detail. *The devil is in the detail*.
