

Next Sunday is Sea Sunday – 'Seafarers and fishers play a vital role in all of our lives, but they often work in difficult, hazardous conditions. Sea Sunday is Sunday 13 July. It is when the Church prays for all those who live and work at sea. Your support will make a big difference to seafarers and fishers in need. This collection is vital to enable Stella Maris [Star of the Sea - the



official Catholic charity for seafarers) to continue its important work, so please give generously. Thank you.'

An urgent request from Holyrood HS Parent Council about cuts to no. 12 Bus effecting children getting to school from wide RC catchment area.

Chris Alcorn, from Northfield & Willowbrae Community Council, writes: 'Many pupils who attend Holy Rood High School do so using the no. 12 Lothian Bus from the Leith area. However, Lothian Buses announced they are stopping the part of the service that children use to and from the High School from August 2025 as apparently "it is not commercially viable". It is the only viable direct service for 135 pupils coming from both Leith and Restalrig and is full of around 60 children each day. There is not a plausible alternative single service, and connecting services are not reliable. There is a legal requirement for baptised Catholics to be able to access Catholic schools in a local authority area. Consequently, Northfield & Willowbrae Community Council, along with Holy Rood High School Parents Council, urge parishioners to write to Lothian Buses CEO Sarah Boyd, Managing Director (mail@lothianbuses.co.uk) and protest about this unjustified diminution of the no. 12 Bus Service that unduly affects our local catholic high school pupils. Thank you.'

Helping Palestine through Caritas – A Message from the Justice & Peace Group

The current conflict in the Holy Land has stretched the Caritas network's ability to respond like no other.

Following nine weeks of total blockade, Israel has proposed a highly restrictive aid distribution plan in Gaza, involving several "logistics and distribution hubs" secured by Israeli forces, where families would be ordered to collect food rations once or twice a month under military oversight, with screenings and security risks compounded by overcrowding and restrictions excluding northern Gaza. As of the 27th of May, this is now the only conduit of assistance into the strip.

Gaza's medical rehabilitation system is at a breaking point – overwhelmed by traumatic injuries, damaged infrastructure, and severe shortages of specialists, supplies, and equipment – leaving persons with disabilities and other vulnerable groups without essential care.

The conflict has severely disrupted education across the West Bank, including East Jerusalem. Approximately 782,000 students face challenges due to movement restrictions, increased violence, and fear of harassment from Israeli settlers and forces. In early May, Israeli authorities permanently shut down six UNRWA-run schools in East Jerusalem.

Approximately 40,000 Palestinians have been forcibly displaced from areas including Jenin, Tulkarem, and Nur Shams, marking the largest such movement since 1967.

SCIAF have been supporting the people who need it most with our partners in Palestine through the Caritas network.

Emergency Health Services

Caritas in Gaza continues to prioritize emergency health services in areas severely impacted by conflict and infrastructure destruction. Four specialized medical teams are actively deployed to provide a broad range of services, including the treatment of common illnesses, chronic diseases, maternal and child healthcare, and elderly care. Medical supplies and medications are being received through the World Health Organization (WHO). But as our colleagues in the region report, medicine without food and water is meaningless.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS)

The mental health and psychosocial needs of the population are profound, particularly in Gaza and the Middle Governorate. Caritas has expanded its MHPSS programs to better address trauma, stress, and grief, with a focus on children, caregivers, and displaced families. Group and individual psychosocial support sessions are regularly conducted, along with therapeutic activities play therapy, which help children and adults process their emotions in a safe, supportive environment.

Multipurpose Cash Assistance (MPCA)

Caritas continues to provide MPCA to families facing extreme hardship but due to the ongoing economic difficulties and high market prices, food remains difficult to find in local markets, and what is available is often priced at unsustainable levels.

Although the guns have largely fallen silent in Lebanon, the violence has caused widespread displacement and suffering affecting communities nationwide. In response, Caritas Lebanon scaled up its efforts to provide critical support, assisting internally displaced persons and those who refuse to leave high-risk areas, ensuring that vulnerable communities receive the help they urgently need. As in Gaza, Caritas Lebanon continues to operate Primary Health Care Centres, Mobile Medical Units, and more than 30 social service/community centres across the country.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK – St Anthony and St Theodosius

Pioneers of Russian and Ukrainian Monasticism - (d. 1073, 1074) - Feast Day: 10 July

"Mindful of the commandment of the good Lord, my unworthy self declares to you that it is good for us to feed the hungry and the homeless with the fruits of our labour.... If God's grace does not uphold and nourish us through the poor, what should we do with all our works?" -St. Theodosius



Anthony, the elder of the two, apparently spent some time in the monastery of Mt. Athos before returning to his homeland. On his return he established a hermitage in a forbidding cave overlooking the city of Kiev. There, despite his extreme austerity, he attracted followers who took up residence in neighbouring caves and submitted to his authority. Eventually he retired again to his solitary life and lived on for another forty years before he finally died in 1073 at the age of ninety. In the meantime, however, he turned over the leadership of his monastery to one of his disciples, a monk named Theodosius.

Theodosius came from a prosperous family. As a young man he had scandalized his family by dressing like a serf and working in the fields. Against his mother's protests he replied, "Our Lord Jesus Christ humbled Himself and underwent degradation, and we have got to follow His example in this too." In 1032 he joined the monks in the Caves of Kiev. Soon after he succeeded Antony as abbot.

Theodosius was in every way a different type of monk and abbot than his holy predecessor. While Antony represented the ascetic style of the early desert fathers, Theodosius recalled instead the spirit of St. Basil. Sanctification, he believed, was not to be pursued through private asceticism but through charity and the discipline of community life. He moved the monks out of their caves and forced them to live together. At the same time, he insisted that the monastery should not exist for the benefit of its members alone but should serve the world. He made sure that the monastery included a hospital for the sick, a guest house for travellers, and a soup kitchen for the hungry. He was personally active in community affairs and was known as a prophetic champion of social justice, even when this brought him into conflict with the local nobility. He made himself available as a spiritual director to any lay people who sought his counsel.

In all things Theodosius tried to lead by example. This extended to his willingness to work in the kitchen and the fields and to take his turn nursing the sick brothers. For his charity, wisdom, and holiness, he was revered as much by the wider community as by his monks. He died in 1074, a year after his master Antony. They were among the first Russian saints to be canonized.

A REFLECTION ON THE READINGS FOR THE FOURTEENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR - ISAIAH 66: 10-14 LUKE 10: 1-12, 17-20

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

At times it appears that 'all of life' is present in Tesco's car park. On Monday I met a shopper who was the double of Charlize Theron – and I have a thing about Charlize Theron. A few years back she was the face of 'J'adore' – by Christian Dior. She waded through golden water wearing a long golden dress and golden strapless sandals. She turns and whispers to me: J'adore Dior.. How I wanted that parfum. Clearly I took just a passing glance! Anyway, back to Tesco's Car Park. Not only was my Tesco shopper stunning to look at – she also was driving an equally stunning car. A jet-black Porsche, with a most amazing shine and inevitable pretentious number plate. "Gorgeous Car', said I. 'Do you like it? It's nice isn't it?' I stared at the hands with well cared for fingers, bright red gelled nails to match her bright red plumped up lips – not quite trout lips but getting there. 'I'm guessing you don't clean the car yourself?!' 'No! I get the P***ks over there to do it. (Think of the fish 'Pollock' drop an '1' and mess around with one of the vowels.) There's an area in the car park given over to car valeting, staffed by Eastern Europeans. Throwing caution to the wind and venturing out onto the thinnest of ice I said: 'You can't say that – that's racist!' 'No, it isn't – I said P***ks, not P***s. It can't be racist – they're white', adding for accuracy 'well, whiteish!' 'Can you really not see how it's racist to talk like that?' She couldn't but she was a nice person and was polite and gave me the time of day – until, that is, she realised she had bought a tub of ice-cream for the kids, and it would be melting! I doubt if I managed to alter her mind-set – but I had tried. It was not for me to stress over the values being handed on to her children. Back home, next to the bathroom mirror, I have a tiny card that reads: For evil to thrive all that is required is for good people to do nothing. I see and read it every night and every morning. I know what I have to do to sleep well.

This weekend the readings speak of peace, flowing peace, flowing goodness and wholeness. Isaiah tells us: *Now towards her I send flowing peace, like a river, and like a stream in spate.* Jesus tells his disciples to go **out,** taking His Word with them. Let if flow from them to every house they visit. Let your first words be 'Peace to this house' Jesus advises that sometime their peace will reside with the family, other times it will come back – but always they must go **out**. They must never tire. Sometimes their task will appear thankless, but the task itself has worth and value.

Have you ever thought how few words we have from Jesus. We have lots of words from the evangelists, lots of tales told. The distillation of Jesus words, and those of Isaiah are the fruits of a lifetime of reflection and prayer. In preparing this reflection each week, I spend about 35 minutes typing but anything up to ten hours just thinking through ideas, reading the scriptures, fitting it with 'stuff' I have learned at college, two stints in therapy, reflecting on the life-form that is 'Tesco Life'. These thoughts and words are the harvest from all of those experiences. Consider for a while, how many hours Isaiah sat watching the streams around him, reflecting and praying. It wasn't a case of 'Right, Here we go! Take this down.' Jesus, too, spent hours on his own. 30 years in fact. That's a lot of thinking time: he watched the birds, he saw farmers sowing and harvesting, fishermen casting and gutting, he snagged his own fingers on rough wood. He knew the inordinate irritation to be caused by the tiniest of splinters and he saw at first hand, the hypocrisy of the organised religion of his day. And then, with all of these experiences to draw on, he shared his few words. They are simple words. They aren't rocket science.

If you're a gardener, or a seamstress, a knitter or a fan of needlepoint, a baker or a chef - you know the joys to be had from solitude and silence, prayerful reflection and just letting the God who dwells deep within you take you to wherever he wants to. Go with Him. It's worth the risk, believe you me. You'll never know who you might meet along the way, but you will gain unimaginable courage, the sort of courage you need to venture onto thin ice!
