ne or more nineteenth-century Surrey workhouses forcibly separated married couples, placing the husband with the men and the wife with the women, forbidding them to meet, except for the twice-weekly services in the local Anglican church. Once the services ended, husbands and wives were again parted. When adults received vouchers for spending in local shops, shop owners protested to the local council because workhouse residents downgraded a shop's status and discouraged its use by more affluent customers.

Anna, in today's Gospel, was an elderly widow, possibly dependent on the Temple for her food and accommodation in return for working around the Temple precincts. She spent all day, every day, devoting herself to prayer and fasting, but she was possibly one of a large group of povertystricken widows who, if they didn't work, didn't eat. Did she have a family? We don't know. The widows received "charity" which limited its support in order to deter others from asking for help - just as would happen in the workhouse, where people often died of hunger and neglect.

Anna was regarded as a prophetess. Did this mean that she was simply a good listener who gave useful advice? We don't know. All we know for certain is that she recognised Jesus as the

Messiah and blessed God, to whom she was important. We don't hear that Temple visitors paid much attention to Anna or Simeon, or else the two elderly people might have changed the world. We need to listen to messengers of hope!
