9 NOVEMBER 2025 - FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA





Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the Temple, he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the moneychangers sitting there. And making a whip of cords... he told, Take these things away; do not make my Father's house a house of trade.' ... (from John 2:13-22)

This Sunday, 9 November 2025, we observe Remembrance Sunday, honouring all who gave their lives for peace and freedom. Please remember the fallen and pray for peace in our world today.

What is this strange feast that we celebrate today – 'The Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica'? It's celebrated every year on 9 November and is one of those feasts that 'trump' a Sunday in Ordinary Time – in this case, the 32nd Sunday of the Year -when it falls on a Sunday. Its origins go back to the 4th century...following the Roman Emperor Constantine granting freedom of worship to the Church in 313, the church was built beside the palace of the Laterani family and consecrated in 324. It (not St Peter's) became the Cathedral of the Diocese of Rome and, until 1309, the popes lived nearby not in the Vatican. Its original dedication is to the Most Holy Saviour, but in the Middle Ages, the names of St John the Baptist and

St John the Evangelist were added (thus, a common name now is 'St John Lateran'). The basilica bears the description: 'Omnium Urbis et Orbis terrarum Mater et Caput' ('of All the Churches in

the City and in the World, the Mother and Head'). Today's feast was extended worldwide to the whole Church in 1565, and is celebrated to emphasize unity with the Papacy and the Holy See...

Day for the Poor – Today, Sunday 9 November is also the World Day of the Poor, a celebration initiated in 2016, by Pope Francis, marking the end of the Year of Mercy. There is a Special Collection **linked with it -** all funds this year go to the Mercy Centre, run by the Sisters of Mercy at St Catharine's Convent of Mercy, Lauriston, Edinburgh . Sr Aelred Timmins writes: "Homeless people come here every day for food, sometimes for sleeping bags, most of all they're looking for friendship and a listening ear. Please keep us in your prayers, we are grateful to anybody who is able to support the works of mercy in this house."

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Blessed Eugene Bossilkov (1900-1952)

Bulgarian Prelate and Bishop of Nikopol – Anniversary: 13 November



Eugene Bossilkov was born into a family of Latin-rite Catholics in northern Bulgaria and was given the name Vincent at his baptism. At this time the mission to northern Bulgaria was entrusted to the Passionist Fathers, and he received his secondary education first at the Passionist minor seminary in Oresc and then at the diocesan seminary in Nikopol. In 1914 he was sent to the Order's seminary in Belgium, where he received the habit in 1919, taking the name Eugene of the Sacred Heart in religion. He was ordained on 25 July 1926, at a time when Catholics in Bulgaria numbered less than 1 per cent of a total population of some three and a half million, of whom the great majority were Eastern Orthodox, with a sizeable Muslim minority.

In 1927 he was sent to Rome to study for a degree at the Pontifical Oriental Institute, and in 1932 he gained a doctorate with a thesis on the union of Bulgaria with the Roman Catholic Church in the early thirteenth century (1204). On his return home in 1933 he

served first as personal secretary to the Passionist Bishop Damian Theelen and then, having expressed a preference for more pastoral work, as pastor in Bardaski-Gheran, where he concentrated on improving the level of religious education among his flock, with particular emphasis on young people.

The government of Bulgaria agreed to cooperate with Hitler's forces in March 1941, thereby avoiding actual occupation by Germany. This put a stop to all missionary endeavours, though it also prevented the Nazi excesses that took place in other eastern European countries. In summer 1944 the government tried to change sides but did so just too late, three days after Stalin had declared war on Bulgaria on 5 September. A "Fatherland Front' government was installed with partisan participation and Soviet military support and moves began to control religious activity. All religious feasts were suppressed, any religious manifestation had to be within church buildings, church schools were confiscated, and all Catholic charities were suppressed. A special law passed in 1949 forbade any religious activity not under state control and all contacts with ecclesiastical bodies outside the country.

Bishop Theelen died in August 1946, and Fr Eugene was chosen as apostolic administrator in anticipation of the nomination of a successor. Despite the prohibitions in force, he ordered a mission to be conducted in each parish and personally took part in these. He was named bishop of Nikopol by Pope Pius XII on 26 July 1947 and made his ad limina visit to Rome in July 1948. He left to go back to Bulgaria on 1 October, despite being advised against returning because of the danger of imprisonment or even death, telling a friend, "I am the shepherd of my flock. I cannot abandon the flock."

After his return the political situation deteriorated, and he advised the Passionist provincial in Holland to recall the missionaries; most left in early 1949. He stayed behind, writing to his provincial, "If it comes to the worst, so be it. I have the courage to go on living. I hope I also have the courage to suffer the worst, always remaining faithful to Christ, the Pope, and the Church." Arrests of priests began the following year, and he was under constant surveillance and unable to move around freely: "I can't take a step without my 'guardian angel' always at my heels. What a feeling!" he wrote to his provincial. He resorted to writing in a simple code, with the government his "dentist" and his troubles his "toothache": "My health is fine, but the dentist won't leave me in peace; it's not easy to free oneself of a dentist of this kind, but that's only part of the entire story!" He was nevertheless able to ordain four priests on 18 December 1951.

On 16 July 1952 the state police took action against every Catholic community in Bulgaria, arresting some forty priests, including the bishop, who was staying in a modest holiday home outside Sofia. Until his trial opened on 29 September there was no further news of him, though evidence was to emerge that he had been savagely tortured in prison. After four days during which the authorities failed to extract any confession of anti-Soviet activities from him or any of those tried with him, he, two Assumptionist religious, and a parish priest were condemned to be shot. Relatives were allowed to visit him for the last time on 6 October; they implored him to ask for clemency, but he refused, saying, "No, I know the Lord will give me the strength to accept death in accordance with his will. I have not denounced anyone... I could have been free to enjoy every possible comfort, if I had wished it." He did ask for blankets, as he was made to sleep on a bare cement floor. His niece Gabriella brought him a basket of food every day until mid-November, the guard returning the empty basket. When it was returned with the food untouched on 18 November, Gabriella was told that he had been executed on the 11th. Confirmation of this reached the Vatican only in 1975, when the Bulgarian Head of State, Todor Zhikov, had an audience with Pope Paul VI, who asked

him directly what had happened to Bishop Bossilkov and was told that he had died "in prison twenty-three years ago." His body was thrown into a common grave and has never been found.

He was beatified in Rome on 15 March 1998. The Bulgarian prosecutor general then started proceedings for his posthumous exoneration, and in May 1999 a decree of the Bulgarian Supreme Court of Appeal found that the 1952 trial records contained "glaring violations" of justice and annulled the death sentence.

A REFLECTION ON THE FEAST OF THE DEDICATION OF THE LATERAN BASILICA

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

One of my favourite anthems of the 70's was the Joni Mitchell song: *Big Yellow Taxi* Its advent into my consciousness coincided with the arrival of Edward P Echlin SJ., that slightly eccentric American Jesuit, who I have mentioned before. Both were instrumental as I took my early faltering steps into the world of ecological awareness. Joni Mitchelll sang of the destruction and decimation of the natural world in the pursuit of wealth and earthly power: *They took all of the trees and put them in a tree museum – and they charged the people a dollar and a half just to see 'em. Don't it always seem to go that you don't know what you've got till it's gone...they paved paradise and put up a parking lot. And so, it went on. We didn't learn then – and we have learned little since. Humans bemoan the decimation of the planet, lament the floods and wildfires but are addicted to air travel, plastic, palm oil, and avocadoes, not to mention bags of ready washed salad leaves – "They're so convenient, aren't they". We take pride that there is no waste – without a thought for the piles of discarded vegetation, left on the floor of the packing plant, because some of the leaves didn't quite pass quality control! Gallons of water used without a thought for the environmental cost – but the packets of salad look so attractive on the supermarket shelves – don't you think?*

In 1983 I was moved from one parish where I was blissfully happy, to one where the exact opposite was true. In the former, there was warmth and camaraderie. We were able to work together, like kindred spirits (though the parish priest found me difficult to make head or tail of). We clicked and life was both enjoyable and productive. The contrasting move saw me struggling. I didn't feel at home in the new parish. The parish priest, by comparison, exuded all the warmth of an iceberg, the pastoral work, too, involved a huge change chaplaincy to two huge psychiatric hospitals for which I had no experience whatsoever, with the only qualification and protection, a clerical collar. I approached the bishop to speak of my struggle and received the somewhat unhelpful reply - "You're not facing any difficulties that haven't been faced by others before you." Pastoral empathy was never his strong point. Years later, I realised that what I was going thorough was a period of mourning. I was longing for the security I had enjoyed in my previous position. I felt adrift. Joni Mitchell became my comfort once again: Don't it always seem to go that you don't know what you've got till it's gone...they paved paradise and put up a parking lot. I struggled find a foothold - something, anything to hold onto. Salvation came my way in the most unforeseen circumstance. One day out in the car, I stumbled, for the first time, across the hamlet of Hartburn in Northumberland. With a population of 194, I was to become a frequent visitor to its 12th century parish Church of St Andrew. The Knights Templar had used the church in the 13th century. The walls exuded a peace that was sacred and comforting in equal measure. It was the sort of place where I could breathe and touch eternity. It was here that I re-discovered an anchor in life, so that I was no longer adrift. On that first visit, I must have stayed for several hours, for it was dark as I left with a kindly vicar calling out into the gloom as he prepared to lock the heavy oak door. I would return many times. I have found that sacred stillness in other places over the years; a small chateau named 'Le Mortier' in Chanceaux-sur-Choisille, near Tours; the Holy Island of Lindisfarne, once the tide has separated the island from the mainland; an agricultural Benedictine monastery in Clervaux (not Clairvaux) in Luxembourg. All places, where I have been blessed with the touch of God, caressing my face, whispering words of comfort and encouragement. All were sacred places where I could gain encouragement. A courage that would embolden and enable me in my attempts to live out the Gospel. Their walls know my secrets and my failures – all left in His hands, so that I could go out – back into his world and to do my best.

This weekend we celebrate the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica. A church built some 800 years before St Andrew's in Hartburn. It is the Pope's parish Church and was dedicated on 9th November 324. It serves as a reminder that though churches are built of stone, places where we can go for sustenance. They aren't meant to be lived in. Attractive though the idea was, I couldn't remain for ever in the Norman simplicity of St Andrew's, Hartburn. Strengthened by my encounter with God, it was time to leave, gird my loins, to remove my self-pity and get on with the task in hand. I am a link in a chain – a bond of connection between others, as Cardinal Newman put it. Sometimes I feel all at sea, overwhelmed by the size of the task: and then, there are other occasions when I have a confidence and self-belief that can only have come from the God who sat beside me when I felt alone. We need sacred moments in life: occasions when we can take time to 'be' in his presence – but then we go out. We aren't afraid. Let us be fearless. Let's pray that timidity can be banished.
