

In early 1944, the Japanese were preparing to attack Imphal in Assam, the gateway to India – a crisis indeed. The Chindits were to drop behind them with a view to cutting off their supply routes around Indawa. John's brigade was to be crash-landed into this operational area by gliders. Landing strips had been cut in the thick of the forests where these gliders could land.

Prior to take-off Wingate himself

inspected the brigade of which John was a member. Wingate walked down the line of officers, stopping in front of John. John was taken aback. Wingate looked him straight in the eye, shook him by the hand and said: "Congratulations, Captain Bradburne, on your escape and upon your M.C." (Military Cross)...

John never spoke much about his war. He told me a little of their

landing in Burma. A large force was in fact crash-landed behind the Japanese lines...

He spoke even less of the year or more that he spent there with the Chindits. A mutual friend told me that John had to be forced into a [protective] slit trench in the thick of battle. He loved to watch the birds...

Perhaps the experience of war helped his eventual detachment from the world, his withdrawal from conventional society. Grace builds upon nature. I believe that God called John to an inner life and the beginnings of a withdrawal from "the world" early in the Malaya campaign. At that time, and later... the seed thus sown began to urge him on in his search – "O Beauty, so ancient and yet so new".
