'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Elizabeth 'Betsy' Fry

English Quaker Prison Reformer (1780-1845) – Anniversary: 12 October

"My mind is in a state of fermentation.

I believe I am going to be religious or some such thing. "



Elizabeth Fry was raised in a prosperous Quaker (the Society of Friends, founded in the 1640's) family, the Gurneys of Norwich, England. Her family represented the more "lax" end of the Quaker spectrum; thus, the children were allowed to sing and dance and wear bright clothes to Meeting. As Elizabeth grew up, however, she was increasingly attracted to the more austere devotional habits of the "Plain Quakers." When she was seventeen an encounter with a Quaker (slavery) abolitionist from the United States stimulated her desire to pursue a path of godly service. Afterward she wrote in her journal, *"I wish the state of enthusiasm I am now in may last, for today I have felt there is a God. I have been devotional, and my mind has been led away from the follies that it is mostly wrapped up in".*

Within two years she was married to Joseph Fry, and her life was subsequently absorbed in the responsibilities of a growing family.

Ultimately, she bore eleven children over a period of twenty-one years. This life was not without its rewards. But after twelve years of marriage, she felt that she was missing out on her true vocation. In her diary she wrote, *"I fear that my life is slipping away to little purpose".*

It was soon afterward that she accepted the invitation of another Quaker to visit the infamous Newgate prison. There she witnessed conditions which filled her with shame and indignation. Women and their young children were crowded into fetid cells, *"tried and untried, misdemeanants and felons"* together, *"in rags and dirt . . . sleeping without bedding on the floor."* In one cell she saw two women strip the clothing off a dead baby to dress another infant.

This was the beginning of a cause, public and private, that Fry pursued for the rest of her life. She began by returning to the prison with clean clothing and straw for the women to lie on. Although the jailers tried to obstruct her efforts, claiming that the women were incorrigible savages, Fry was determined to respond to them in a manner befitting their humanity. When she asked them whether they would like her to provide instruction to their children, they responded eagerly, with many of the illiterate women pressing in to benefit from her lessons.

With the support of a committee of other Quaker women Fry launched a campaign for general prison reform. This achieved many results, including provisions for larger living quarters, better food, fresh air, and the supply of sewing materials to provide the women with some occupation and a means of earning money. Over the years Fry was tireless in her efforts, which eventually extended throughout England and Scotland. There were some who criticized her on the grounds that her devotion to this cause entailed the neglect of her family. She too upbraided herself at times. As she wrote in her journal in 1817:

My mind too much tossed by a variety of interests and duties — husband, children, household, accounts, meetings, the church, near relations, friends, and Newgate — most of these things press a good deal upon me. I hope I am not undertaking too much, but it is a little like being in the whirlwind and in the storm.

Her efforts also elicited public opposition from those who felt that to humanize the prisons was to undermine their deterrent value, thus *"removing the dread of punishment in the criminal classes."* But Fry was motivated by the conviction that prisoners, regardless of their crimes, were human beings who bore within them the spark of the divine image.

It was sacrilege to treat them with no more than punitive cruelty. Fry continued to live in the whirlwind and pressed on with her cause, in season and out, until the end of her life on October 12, 1845.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL OF THE 28th SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – LUKE 17:11-19

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

I have lived with what is euphemistically referred to as a ‘dicky-ticker’ for the last 40 years or so. Any inherent physiological weakness was exacerbated by my alcoholic addiction...Like many alcoholics, I viewed myself as indestructible – or that ‘tomorrow’ would be soon enough to get my health in order. Once I learned (somewhat inaccurately) that the liver is the only organ in the body capable of repairing itself, my addiction was given a new lease of life. The addiction took its toll – and over the years I have gained a wide and varied experience of an array of medications. Experience does not an expert make! I thought I was an expert, and this almost led to my demise. I had accumulated quite a collection of current and discontinued medication. In 2015, after a particularly aggressive bout of paroxysmal atrial fibrillation (you see – I even have the terminology off-pat) I self-administered from my extensive drug shelf, a drug called Flecainide Acetate – with catastrophic consequences. My heart went berserk. The GP was unable to take a pulse reading so fast was the heartbeat and she sent me straight to hospital. ‘Go by car – you haven’t time to wait for an ambulance – but don’t drive. Can someone take you?’ She was trying – and failing somewhat - to appear calm. Mindful that you probably want to get on with the rest of your life, I’ll cut to the chase. Upon admission I was wired up to variety of machines which may have provided useful information to the attending medics, but which screamed like a herd of banshees. I was given a drug intravenously which I was warned would make me feel nauseous and slow the heart right down. It did indeed make me feel nauseous, but my heart continued in its pursuit of a world-record. I needed a cardioversion but there was no theatre space available, so the cardiologist took the decision to conduct said cardioversion where I was. He needed my consent as the process was risky, given the absence of theatre back-up. Terror didn’t come close to describing my feelings – then word came – there was space in one of the theatres. I was wheeled away at speed and introduced to an anaesthetist of gentle, almost angelic manner – and whose forearms were covered – and I mean covered – with tattoos. He would have blended into any dockyard setting. Recognising the fear in my eyes, he asked me to keep looking at him as he fed the liquid into the canula. I felt reassured. Off I drifted.....

When I woke up some time later – I have no idea how much later, I felt that I had just completed a marathon but the machine to which I had been attached was bleeping rhythmically, if fast. I was reassured that this would settle. The cardiologist came to see me – ‘you gave us quite a scare!’ I kept saying ‘Thank you. Thank you’ shaking him by the hand with as much energy as I could muster. He gave some instructions to the nursing staff – and took his leave. I went back to sleep. Exhaustion was taking hold once more, but gratitude was the overwhelming emotion washing over me in waves.

It's impossible to feel happy if there is no gratitude in our hearts. So often in life, we get what we want – but not always what we need. It's those moments when we receive what we need that evoke a real sense of gratitude. You cannot be unhappy if you possess gratitude. Gratitude is the life-blood of the spirit, the soul. Somewhere at home, you have a Thank You card, or a Thank You letter that you refuse to consign to the recycling bin. You received it many years ago and it means a great deal to you. Over the years you have taken it out to re-read, before carefully putting it back in the drawer. It makes you feel warm inside and still is capable of producing a lump in your throat, a tear in your eye. It is one of your treasured possessions. At one level, it's a piece of paper with some words written on it but reams of paper would be needed to fully describe what it means to you.

Just as you derive immense joy from the simple act of someone saying, "Thank you", so too, you can generate so much happiness when you say those same two words to someone else. You have probably read "Winnie the Pooh". I love Piglet! *"Piglet noticed that even though he had a Very Small Heart, it could hold a rather large amount of Gratitude."*

In today's Gospel we read of the 10 lepers cured by Jesus but only one of them was moved to say, "Thank you". Jesus tells him that his faith has saved him, and in doing so reminds us that there is more to Jesus' ministry than just curing the sick. He speaks to the heart, and he liberates our hearts that we may be filled with gratitude. *Your faith has saved you.* Gratitude lies at the very heart of our salvation. So, today say "Thank you" and mean it. Be grateful - and you will find happiness. You will receive what you need. Learn from Piglet. Ask for what you need rather than what you want. And be grateful!
