No wonder Peter, in his usual rather impulsive fashion, blurts out the clumsy suggestion about setting up the tents!

Images can have a profound effect. Think how the pictures of starving children in Ethiopia led to the Live Aid concert of the 1980s. They were a wakeup call to the world to help those suffering the effects of famine. Consider the television news reports which bring us pictures of people trapped by earthquakes or volcanic eruptions or warfare - far more effective than mere verbal descriptions of these events in far-off lands where suffering can be alleviated if enough people are aware.

The i-cloud had not come to Galilee in their time but God's message was projected into the ether for the apostles to understand that this Jesus was his Son, the Chosen One who must be listened to. The experience was surely a great shock but unforgettable for Peter, James and John. And so, for us, the Gospel narrative of the Transfiguration is a wake-up call to acknowledge the true nature of Jesus; the reality of who he is: the evangelist's equivalent of a modern documentary disclosing the truth about the Son of God.

Following many years in the classroom, retired teacher and head of RE, Mary Bell now has time to enjoy the beauties of the natural world around her.

I am invited to listen to Jesus, and Jesus manifests himself, and by his transfiguration he invites us to gaze at him. And looking at Jesus purifies our eyes and prepares them for eternal life, for the vision of heaven.
