



'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Sister Stan Kennedy (1939-2025)

Irish Social Activist – Anniversary: 3 November

The nun who 'gave Ireland a conscience', who left behind a 'rather wild' youth to challenge the Catholic Church's wealth and was once silenced by the Vatican, dies aged 86.



When the 18-year-old Treasa Kennedy told her friends in Lispole, on the Dingle Peninsula in Co Kerry, that she was entering a convent, they expressed total incredulity at the idea.

The girl who loved dancing, the lively, flirtatious one among her friends who stayed late at the local dances, had an ear for music and an eye for a good-looking young man, was the last in her garrulous circle who was thought likely to become a nun.

The future sister later admitted that in her youth she was "rather wild" and recalled that, on the July day in 1958 when she entered the Religious Sisters of Charity, the sound of a carnival carried through the convent windows. "I could hear the music," she said, "and I remember thinking, "That's where I should be."

It was that same impulsive warmth — part rebellion, part compassion — that made Sister Stanislaus Kennedy, as she became, but known to all as Sister Stan, one of the most remarkable voices for social reform in modern Ireland.

As the founder of the housing trust *Focus Ireland*, she transformed the country's approach to homelessness; through the Immigrant Council of Ireland, she fought for the rights of new arrivals; and at The Sanctuary, a centre for meditation in Dublin's north inner city, she created a space for quiet in a noisy world.

She stood with the poor, the excluded and the newly arrived, and she did so not from behind an institution but amid the hands-on, raw reality of urban need. What made her unusual among Irish nuns was that she was also a critic — sometimes a very sharp one — of her own church.

She was forthright in arguing that the Catholic Church in Ireland had grown "too comfortable", and that the wealth and display of ecclesiastical life ran contrary to the gospel it proclaimed. "Keep an eye on her," one bishop warned. "She may be a nun, but she's a nun with a flick-knife."

In Kilkenny, where she worked for nearly two decades before moving to Dublin, she urged the church to "identify more with the poor". Later, she wrote a paper suggesting that the church's unused property should be devoted to the homeless; it "caused all hell to break loose", as she put it. The paper was sent to Rome, and she was formally silenced by the Vatican for a time, a rebuke that did nothing to dampen her independence. Her criticisms were always grounded in practical work. When she began researching homelessness in Dublin in the early 1980s, she lived for a time with young women sleeping rough on the streets, better to understand their world. From that experience came Focus Point, later Focus Ireland, now the country's largest voluntary housing organisation. She believed that service without advocacy was useless, and she badgered government ministers and bishops alike for change. Charles Haughey, the former taoiseach, once called her "the most intransigent woman I've ever met". She took it as a great compliment.

Treasa Kennedy was born in the hamlet of Lispole, Co Kerry, in 1939, the fourth of five children of a small farmer, Tadhg Kennedy, and his wife, Bridget, both of whom were native Irish speakers. The family lived modestly, yet with music, language and faith at its core. Her mother, a young woman from Dingle who had once worked in the American home of Alexander Graham Bell's family before returning to marry, filled the house with stories of the wider world. Treasa was educated at the secondary school in Dingle before taking her yows.

After early postings in education and social work in Kilkenny, she studied social science at University College Dublin. Her doctoral research on women's homelessness became the foundation of Focus Ireland. In 1998 she

founded *The Sanctuary*, and in 2001, she co-founded both the *Immigrant Council of Ireland* and *Young Social Innovators*, encouraging a generation of teenagers to engage with social problems rather than lament them. Her voice on immigration remained steadfast and humane to the end. Having welcomed migrants to Ireland when few others did, she defended them again amid the tensions of recent years. "Our health service would fall asunder if we didn't have migrants," she said last year, pointing out that nurses, carers and cleaners from abroad had become the backbone of Irish daily life.

While recognising that accommodation pressures were real, she urged the country to keep its sense of proportion and generosity. She brought a moral clarity to policy discussions that sometimes unsettled politicians. She was an early supporter of female priests, optional celibacy and same-sex marriage, arguing that equality and inclusion were not political but theological imperatives.

For all her public profile, she cultivated a private inward life. At *The Sanctuary*, she taught meditation and published a string of reflective books, among them *The Road Home* (2012), a memoir whose tender descriptions of her Kerry childhood were matched by a steely analysis of modern Ireland's inequality. Over the years, she wrote or edited more than two dozen titles.

Sister Stan combined in her person the traditional Irish religious — habit, rosary, and all — with the uncompromising reformer who believed faith must walk the streets. "Stillness," she once said, "is not escape; it's where you find courage." Her courage, as President Michael D Higgins said of her, "helped give Ireland a conscience".

Sister Stanislaus Kennedy, social activist, was born on 19 June 1939. She died following a short illness on 3 November 2025, aged 86.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 33RD SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – LUKE 21:5-19

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

On Tuesday, driving into Hexham I stumbled across part of a drama on Radio 4. In the clip, I could hear the dialogue between a precocious young child asking his dad: Why is the word 'dictionary' listed in the dictionary? There was an innocence to his logic. He went on to reason: You must know what a dictionary is for, otherwise why would you use it? So why define the word 'dictionary' .. It doesn't make sense.. The bit of the play I heard, sparked my interest, When I get back home I will be grabbing my dictionary from the top shelf of the bookcase. But, before that, it was time for my date!

I was going to meet 'Gaia'. She presents a fine spectacle – with a figure to die for. She is the creation of the artist Luke Jerram and stands – or rather spins with dimensions of 7 metres in diameter. Illuminate from the inside, her surface is made up of imagery from NASA. The Abbey transept suited her majesty perfectly. Sat underneath, I watched oceans and mountain ranges, continents and countries move slowly across my vision and consciousness. Gaia is beautiful. Her name comes from Ancient Greek Mythology. In Greek mythology she is the primordial deity – existing before all of the other Greek gods. Her age does not belie her beauty or majesty. Humankind has done its best to destroy her, ravaging her core and trying to suffocate her with plastic, litter and detritus, polluting her crystal; clear waters and decimating her beauty but the hope remains that long after humans have self-destructed, she will spin on, bringing glory to the God who created her. Sometimes art does little for me, I am thinking of Tracy Emin's bed – though I can just about understand Damian Hirst's obsession with cows and formaldehyde - but there are other occasions where I am moved to tears or struck dumb. Gaia did both to me. I fought the tears that welled up and grew in frustration when searching for the words that could adequately describe my feelings. Oh, to have a dictionary to hand! I was overwhelmed by the paucity of expression.

I looked around for a dictionary to help me find adequate eloquence to counter the emotional roller coaster that threatened me. I stared at the vastness of the Pacific Ocean, the majestic cloud cover swirling over the Himalayas. I was adrift, lost in wonder – but no words came to help me steer a course. Just when I needed one – there was no dictionary to hand. I climbed the steps to the choir gallery and looked down on her beaty, spinning slowly beneath me. Was this the view that God enjoyed, I wondered? Greek mythology may have needed a goddess to describe the earth. They may have called her Gaia, but I needed no such help– for I enjoy the love and friendship of God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit. As I stared at Gaia I became aware of my insignificance – and, in a strange way, my significance. God knows me. He knows my name. He knows my anxieties and secrets, my hopes and my fears. He knows me – and His world spins...for me.

I returned home. I went straight in to reach for my dictionary. The character in the radio 4 play was correct. The word 'dictionary' did indeed appear in my dictionary. There were entries for 'word', 'paragraph', 'sentence' 'chapter' – everything, in fact, that you and I instinctively understand but which are explained and defined so that others, without our nascent understanding, might learn their meanings. It was Mrs Garton in Junior School who taught us how to use a dictionary and who introduced us to its treasures. A young child, approaching my first decade I would read the dictionary for pleasure. There is, however, only one word that really matters. The Word. The Word that was made flesh and lived among us - and who shared Gaia's majesty, blessing it with the footsteps he trod.

This weekend we see him engaging with some tourists, visiting Jerusalem. His words carry warning. The Temple – even in its finery is as nothing in comparison to the eternity that is the Godhead. The group before him do not realise who it is that they are talking to, have no understanding. He is warning that all things pass – be they wars, famines, earthquakes, fine buildings, leaders, dynasties. Only God remains, steadfast and resolute. He warns them not to put their trust or faith in things that have no lasting value. Jesus offers a new way and a new hope. His credibility rests on his authenticity.

So, this weekend he leaves us much to ponder. Where do our priorities lie? All things pass. A sunrise doesn't last all morning; a cloudburst doesn't last all day. Monuments, Castles and Cathedrals all eventually fade. Trillionaires and Billionaires all must die. Dynasties always end. Only His Word endures. Stick with that Word.
