SAINT OF THE WEEK — St Madeleine Sophie Barat (1779-1865)

Foundress of our Sacred Heart Sisters in Lauder Lodge – Feast Day: 25 May



Madeleine's birth was dramatic and her education exceptionally severe; surviving both, not to mention the French Revolution, as she did, proved a good preparation for founding and leading a great religious Order.

She was born two months prematurely during a fire that swept through the timber houses of her hometown, Joigny in Burgundy. She was not expected to survive and was handed to her ten-year-old brother, Louis, to be rushed to church and christened. The men of the town were fighting the fire, so the priest made Louis act as godfather. The solemn promises he made under such conditions made a deep impression on him. He went away to study for the priesthood and returned to Joigny after the seminary to teach mathematics and wait until he was old enough to be ordained. Assuming his responsibilities as her godfather as he saw fit, he set about educating his sister, who by then was ten. He put her through long days of Latin, Greek, mathematics, history, and botany, never praising or encouraging her, endlessly finding fault and correcting. She flourished under this regime, which lasted for the first four years of the Revolution and carried on studying on her own

when Louis was ordained. At first, Louis took the oath to the Civil Constitution of the Clergy, then retracted, went to Paris, was thrown into prison, and escaped the guillotine only because a former schoolmate kept his name off the daily lists of those condemned to die.

He was released in 1795, when Madeleine was sixteen and determined to enter a religious Order. These had all been suppressed and there was nowhere she could join. Louis took her back to Paris, determined that she should now embark on theological studies. The outcome was a unique person—a woman with the education provided by the seminaries, closed to women. She was still diffident, however, and wanted to become a Carmelite lay Sister. Then, through Louis, she met the Abbé de Varin, who was planning an Order of the Sacred Heart, based on the Jesuits (who had been suppressed in 1773) but with an equivalent Order for women. He saw that Madeleine had the qualities to lead such an Order, telling her that her gifts and education were not meant to be kept in a cloister. She seems simply to have followed all his proposals.

In 1800, by when the ban on religious Orders had been relaxed, she and three others were clothed as nuns; the following year they took over a school in Amiens, which soon acquired a high academic reputation and attracted daughters of émigrés returning after the Revolution. By the time Madeleine was twenty-three she was appointed superior. Growth was immediate and rapid: the new Order converted abandoned abbeys and convents and took in former members of other Orders, including Philippine Duchesne, who was to bring the Order to the United States. Madeleine—by now Mother Barat—had to abandon teaching and spend her time interviewing new applicants and overseeing new foundations, of boarding schools for those who could pay fees and of day schools for those who could not. She was in the happy position of being able to take only first-class teachers. For the first few years her Order had no name, though initially the Sisters were known as *Ladies of Faith*, but in 1807 Napoleon, under pressure from his devout mother, gave it official recognition as the *Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus*.

There were years of internal strife, with divisions opened up by the personal ambitions that seem to dog all rapidly growing institutions, but Mother Barat's technique of waiting and praying usually (because she was usually in the right) caused opposition to her to collapse. She guided through a revised Constitution, with a new Rule and a new habit (the original, white-frilled cap, with a black gauze veil worn over it, was perhaps not very practical for teaching) in 1815, when the Church in France regained some of its autonomy after Napoleon's defeat at Waterloo. The following year she opened a new motherhouse in Paris, where she received royal visitors and an increasing number of aristocratic parents who wanted their girls to be educated in Sacred Heart schools. "Bishop after bishop" came to her, wanting schools in their dioceses. Mother Barat managed to remain her simple, though capable, self through all this. The Society was formally approved by the pope in 1826 (despite lingering Vatican opposition to unenclosed women religious) and opened houses in Rome and Turin as well as those in the United States that grew out of the first foundation at St Charles on the Missouri River in 1818. Her health grew worse, not helped by accidents, and she was unable to visit most of her overseas foundations, though she continued to travel all over France. She resisted an attempt radically to overhaul the

Constitution in 1839, but she was always looking for ways to keep the educational approach attuned to changing times, revising the study-plan in the Society's schools every six years.

The coming of the railways made her constant travelling far easier. She gradually slowed down, finding time to talk to children and befriend animals, but it was not until she was eighty-five that, having threatened to resign, she was given a vicar-general to help her. But it was too late for any real retirement, and she died less than a year later, on Ascension Day 1865. She lived well into the age of photography but refused to have her picture taken, so all likenesses of her are based on a photograph taken after her death. She had been in charge of the Society for sixty-four years, and it had grown to eighty-six houses (which would have been more had not hostile governments closed a further twenty-five) and three thousand five hundred Sisters. Today, they still teach worldwide, as well as caring for the poor, doing pastoral work in hospitals, parishes, and prisons, and acting as spiritual counsellors and retreat-givers.

Madeleine Sophie Barat, one of the Church's great innovators, was beatified in 1908 and canonized in 1926, when St Peter's Basilica was filled with thousands of girls and women who had been educated in Sacred Heart schools.

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER - John 13:31-35

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

You may remember Fife Robertson. An avuncular figure, born in Edinburgh, his career path took him into journalism. For many years he worked as a roving reporter for the BBC appearing regularly on the 'Tonight' programmes of the 1960's and 70's. On an almost daily basis he would find himself in some obscure location, interviewing an even more obscure person, reporting on a triply obscure event, or some peculiarly idiosyncratic behaviour. His opening catchphrase was a godsend to satirical comedians of the time. In lilting overemphasized Scottish bonhomie, he would almost sing to his audience: 'Hello-oo-oh, I'm Fife Robertson and I'm standing here in the middle of Badachro near Gairloch, and just down the road from Loch Maree. I'm here By sheer happenstance that was where we found ourselves last Saturday evening after a ninehour drive with laden car and panting Dobermanns, having left Hexham at 9 am that same morning. My inner Fife Robertson would not be silenced. I remembered enough of his lilting delivery to attempt an impersonation: I found myself saying 'Wow' repeatedly, and then: 'I'm standing here in the middle of Gairloch, and I cannot believe the beauty that stretches before me'. We had taken a holiday cottage with a large dog-friendly, enclosed garden. The western sky was still ablaze with glorious sunshine, the tall trees standing to attention either side of the garden drew us down to The Minch, a name I had never heard of, but then again, I had never heard of the Gulf of America. The Atlantic, in that seamless way favoured by oceans the world over, becomes The Minch, part of the Inner Seas of the West Coast of Scotland. Over the course of the week, Adrian has swum with seals and I have sat on and walked over rocks that are over 3,000,000,000 years old – that's three thousand million the oldest rocks in Britain. How small and insignificant we all are. Fife Robertson might have said: 'I'm sitting here, surrounded by God's splendour and majesty. What is my 71¾ years in comparison?' It has been as if I am standing shoulder-to-shoulder with the God of all creation. I look, I gaze, I stare, and I marvel. I am in the company of an old friend., He is bigger than me. These rocks are bigger, more majestic than me, yet He loves me. Humility is called for, coupled with reverence. This is His world – I am merely passing through. Respect is due.

Yesterday, we came into very close eyeball contact with a magnificently antlered Stag. He stared at us, we at him. Dobermann's have a strong prey-drive. Show them a sheep and they make Hannibal Lecter appear amateur. Yesterday they were transfixed. They sat bolt upright, with a pose worthy of the show ring at Crufts. They reminded me of primary school, when the Parish Priest would visit each classroom. "Now sit up everyone, fold your arms, and pay attention: Father Fitzpatrick has something important to say to you." - he hadn't! He had come in to say hello, to recite a funny limerick or elaborate an obscure shaggy-dog story, thereby reducing the well-disciplined room full of 8-year-olds into an hysterical rabble before leaving Mrs Garton to sort order from chaos. Oh, how she must have loved those visits! But, back to the Stag in all his magnificence. We looked and admired each other. It was we who made to turn first. The dogs turned with us, without any hint of their usual: *Let me at him...* We were in his territory. We were but visitors. This land was his. We knew our place, as he did his. Respect was due.

Humility and respect make for easy bedfellows. They are, as we say, a marriage made in heaven. The entirety of my life does not even equate to a blink when compared to the Lewisian Complex – the three thousand million years old rocks I have dared to tread this week. This weekend's Gospel sees Jesus addressing his disciples in the seconds immediately after Judas has gone to do his deeds. Despite Judas' intentions, Jesus still chose to wash his feet along with those of the other disciples. To wash feet is an act of humility. To wash the feet of the man who is about to betray you, requires more. Respect where it is due. Jesus shows us the path to real humility. In humility lies acceptance of who we are and what it is we must do. John the evangelist tells us: When Judas had gone, Jesus said: now has the Son of Man been glorified. Jesus then gave his commandment: 'Love one another, as I have loved you'. It's easy to love those with whom we are in love – it is much more difficult to love those who hurt us, those who betray us. It's hard to love those who have nothing to give in return.

Jesus has been drawn to this moment. This one moment in the millions of years that the earth has existed. This one moment requires abject and complete humility. *His state was divine, yet he did not cling to equality with God, but became as we are.* The disciples saw that humility, and they were in awe. Respect where it is due.
