Witness to justice

"Why do the saints have followers?" asks [the French philosopher] Bergson. "They demand nothing; yet people do, of their own accord, what the saints would have them do. The saints do not need to exhort; all they need to do is be. Their very existence is a call to perfection."

We know this from our own experience. To many people, the teaching of the Church is valid; it is convincing to the mind. But if it

is to be efficacious, if it is to move them to action, it must be backed up by life; backed up by those who have accepted the Gospel, live the Gospel, and activate their personal, family and community lives with the justice of the Gospel.

This will not be easy. Let us be realistic. It is not easy to be just. True, the example of a Christian life, a just life, will be followed by many, will be an inspiration to many. But it will also be a sign that

is contradicted. How can it be otherwise? Christ himself was such a sign, and the servant is not greater than his master...

And very often, it is by suffering that the just man will bear witness, that "what he says is true". To bear witness by one's life is to put that life at the service of an ideal, no matter what it may cost. To bear witness by one's life is to be ready to lose it. We call those who have given up their lives for the Christian ideal, martyrs. What does "martyr" mean? It means, simply, "witness".
