


The Women at the Sepulchre, 1927, by British artist Harold Copping

'SAINT' OF THE WEEK – Käthe Kollwitz

German Artist (1867-1945) – Feast Day:22 April

"One day, a new idea will arise and there will be an end to all wars. I die convinced of this. It will need much hard work, but it will be achieved."



Käthe Kollwitz, one of the great artists of the twentieth century, was an avowed socialist and pacifist. In her artistic vision these words were not mere ideological labels. They represented a moral and spiritual affirmation of the preciousness of human life and a spirit of resistance to all the idols of death.

She was born in Konigsburg in East Prussia in 1867 (now Germany), the daughter of a minister. She lived most of her life in Berlin, where she married Karl Kollwitz, a doctor who practiced medicine in a working-class section of the city. She drew on his patients as models for many of her drawings and lithographs. Few other artists have been so committed to representing the private struggles and suffering of the poor. Her depictions of hunger, unemployment, domestic violence, and the oppressive burden of despair are among the most poignant images in all of twentieth-century art.

Kollwitz was particularly sensitive to the experience of women, especially the aspects of maternal love. Many of her drawings depict mothers delighting in the presence of their children. But she also depicted a mother's fierce determination to protect her young, and the corresponding potential for devastating loss. Kollwitz herself was no stranger to such loss. In World War I her youngest son, Peter, was killed at the front. His death struck *"like a thunderbolt,"* for a long time crippling her ability to work. *"Peter,"* she wrote, *"was seed for the planting that should not have been ground."* Eventually she transformed her grief into a passionate commitment to peace and the struggle against all the causes of war.

She had sympathized with the communist revolution in Russia as well as the parallel revolutionary struggles in Germany. In a powerful sequence of engravings, she celebrated the doomed Peasants' Revolt of the sixteenth century and its mythic embodiment in the peasant mother, Black Anna. But with the death of her son her commitment to socialism became intertwined with a resolute pacifism.

After the war, she was commissioned to design a war memorial at the Soldiers Cemetery near Dixmuiden. She worked on the statue for many years. When it was finally unveiled in 1932, it revealed a scene entitled *"Mourning Parents,"* its figures plainly modelled after herself and her husband, Karl. It remains a devastating image of sorrow over the waste of life.

In the years to come Kollwitz continued to put her art at the service of her conscience and her spiritual vision. With the rise of the Nazis, however, her work was banned and could not be publicly shown. She managed to remain in Berlin throughout the Nazi era and the devastation of the war. Her husband died in 1940. Two years later, her grandson, another Peter, was killed in action.

Still, driven by her sense of personal responsibility, she continued to draw as long as health permitted. As she wrote, "Culture arises only when the individual fulfils his cycle of obligations. If everyone recognizes and fulfils his cycle of obligations, genuineness emerges. The culture of a whole nation can in the final analysis be built upon nothing else."

In April 1945 her granddaughter asked her if she was a pacifist. "Yes," she answered, "if you understand by pacifism more than just antiwar. It is a new idea that of the brotherhood of man."

She died on April 22, a few days before the Armistice.

Magdalene's, St. John's, St. Ninian's, and St. Mary, Star of the Sea - are organizing a Pilgrimage of Hope on Saturday, May 10, 2025. Parishioners are invited to walk as much or as little of the route as they wish or are able to. Those unable to walk but still wishing to participate are welcome to use bicycles or share car/public transport.

Our Pilgrimage will begin at St Teresa of Lisieux, Craigmillar.

You are invited to meet here at 10am for a short introduction to our pilgrimage and we will then begin walking at approximately 10:15am.

Our first stop will be at St Mary Magdalene Parish Church (1.5km). We aim to depart from St Mary Magdalene's at 10:40am to walk approximately 2km to St John the Evangelist, Portobello.

We will then continue on our pilgrimage and walk approximately 3km to St Ninian and Triduana's. We will depart from St John's at 11.00am.

On route to St Ninian and Triduana's we will make a stop at St Triduana's Well which is situated in Restalrig Village within Restalrig Collegiate Church.



A REFLECTION ON THE SECOND READING FOR EASTER SUNDAY - Colossians 3:1-4

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

We live in a divided world. That much is obvious. Israel is trying to erase all trace of Palestine; Russia seeks to own Ukraine and is using soldiers supplied by North Korea and weapons from China. Trump is at loggerheads with China but tells us he can do business with Putin and wants to turn Gaza into a holiday resort so needs Netanyahu and will not criticize. Kin Jong-Un doesn't like Trump this time around, but this may change. Europe sides with Ukraine and Trump with Russia, whilst all the time desperate to be seen as a friend of King Charles. And then we have Myanmar, the Sudan, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Greenland, Panama. There is a surfeit of sadness and injustice. We look to political leaders to do their duty and give an example of service – some opt instead to emphasise differences, to prolong injustice and drive wedges between as many peoples as possible. Divide and conquer is their mantra. Our God is the God of equality and the responsibility to protect that equality lies at the feet of those who jealously guard what they don't need to the detriment of those who lack what they do need. It's the age-old problem. Greed.

Fortunately, there is a glimmer of hope: Donald Trump has passed his annual medical – and with flying colours! As befits someone suffering from advanced and terminal narcissism, he 'aced' his cognitive test: his doctor told him that his heart was good, and that he had a good soul – a very good soul. His cult followers – that's C.U.L.T - lapped up the news. You can easily spot members of his cult – they're often clinically obese, have identical teeth, wear red baseball caps – even when going out to dinner, and they are predominantly, though not exclusively, white. I have no desire to mix with them, but I do want to meet that doctor. I think I could easily fill an Airbus A330 with pilgrims eager to meet this doctor with the mystical powers, eager for him to perform health-checks on their 'souls'. Those of us with half a brain-cell realise that Trump is talking as much sense as normal, but still, there are some who believe him, thus ensuring that his message of division and hate lives for a while longer. You could reserve your seat on my inaugural flight, - or you could delve deep into your own conscience. This is a more effective way of assessing the condition of your soul – and cheaper. In silence, God and Jesus speak to us all.

We have reached the climactic conclusion of the Easter Triduum. Jesus paid the ultimate price for refusing to dilute his message. He insisted that all were equal in the eyes of his Father, prostitutes and pharisees alike, lepers and healthy, beggars and landowners. The power class didn't like it – so he called them out: You're just a brood of vipers, no more than whitened sepulchres – pristine on the outside yet rancid and toxic on the inside. It was a perfect lesson in "How not to make friends!". The oligarchs of the day laughingly thought they could enjoy the last word. They thought that by executing this loud-mouth, they could destroy the message. They failed to understand the wisdom you and I enjoy and was first spoken by Gamaliel (Acts 5:34-49): You cannot kill an idea. He is risen. His message lives on. He cannot be destroyed. The Cross becomes our symbol of hope, and we are proud to hold it aloft. The devastation of Good Friday was not the final word. He is Risen -Alleluia! Alleluia! This is why Paul in his letter to the Colossians urges us to look for the things that are in Heaven, where Christ is, sitting at God's right hand. We lift up our eyes away from the gloom and despair that makes up much of the fabric of our lives, we shun the cults, particularly that cult, and we leave our thoughts at the altar of heavenly things. We cannot avoid trial, tribulation, disappointment, or dismay. They are as much a part of life as are the birds of the air, the sky above us and the grass beneath our feet. As I type these words – and you read them – the United Nations estimates that there are HUNDREDS of innocent Palestinian women and children buried under the rubble of Gaza. Many might well be still alive – slowly suffocating because the invading forces will not allow entry for the much-needed heavy lifting equipment. Their plight goes unreported because the world's media is more interested in Trump's Stock Market woes. During his life, Jesus who trod that same earth, did not remain silent when faced with such cruelty and injustice - and nor should we. He is the final Word, He is the Word made Flesh, He is God incarnate. And He is Risen. So today we rejoice and are glad, for this day was made by the Lord. He has conquered death, and he invites us to share the victory. We are not afraid to share that conviction with those around us, for we find ourselves in a world that is hungry for hope. Who will offer that hope - if not us?.
