### 'SAINT' OF THE WEEK - Bd Benedicta Cambiagio Frassinello

Founder of the Benedictine Sisters of Providence (1791-1858) – Feast Day: 21 March



Benedicta, from a simple peasant farming family in Liguria near Genoa, was one of those indomitable nineteenth-century women who perceived a social need, saw it as God's will that they should do something to remedy it, and set about doing so, often in the teeth of opposition from prejudiced ecclesiastical authorities.

When she was sixteen, Napoleon annexed Liguria. Her family left their land and opened a greengrocer shop in the main street of the university town of Pavia, south of Milan. She was much given to reading Lives of the Saints and very taken with the asceticism of the Desert Fathers. She ran away from home and lived in a cave on nuts and berries for a week before being found and taken back. She realized this was a fantasy but still craved the religious life, and in the meantime she indulged in excessive penitential practices. Her parents decided that marriage was the only solution and found a husband; a kind, skilful, intelligent though illiterate young man named Giovanni Battista Frasinello. They were married in February 1816.

Giovanni proved his essentially Christian nature by agreeing to take Benedicta's terminally ill sister, Maria, into their house after her husband had abandoned her. She was to live for another nine years in their care. Meanwhile, after two years of marriage, Benedicta and Giovanni decided to live in celibacy and to devote themselves to rescuing young girls who hung around the university, offering themselves as prostitutes to the students. Both the Bishop of Pavia and Benedicta's confessor effectively told her that such prostitution was inevitable and that she should forget the venture. After Maria's death in 1825, wife and husband entered religious life, she in a Capuchin convent and he as a lay brother with the Somaschi Canons.

After a time of peace, enjoying the prayerful silence of the convent, Benedicta again felt the call to an apostolate for young people. The community tried to dissuade her, and the conflict made her ill. The bishop had her sent home, apparently in response to a dream. Benedicta, seemingly at death's door, retaliated with a more powerful guiding dream in which St Jerome Emiliani told her to dedicate her life to young girls in moral peril. This was plainly what she wanted to hear: she recovered her health and set about the task, gathered seven desperate young girls and, with others interested in the work, settled with them in a run-down house. Her parents regarded this as an insult to the family and persuaded the bishop to get Giovanni back to dissuade Benedicta, But he joined her in the venture, and the number of girls soon reached one hundred. A rich layman helped them buy another house.

Benedicta organized her helpers like a monastic community, with shared ideals underpinned by a Rule. Chronically short of funds, they threw themselves on divine providence, and benefactors appeared in the nick of time to show the efficacy of this. Bishop Tosi, now aged and infirm, appointed an administrative committee to help him run the diocese. Many of its members did not like what they found at "Benedicta's Hospice" and were soon spreading gossip to discredit her. The bishop believed this and forced her to leave not only the hospice but the town as well. Giovanni and five co-workers went with her, and they set up a similar venture in his birthplace, Ronco Scrivia, north of Genoa. There the community prospered, opening a school and an orphanage and growing into a Congregation, which received official approval in 1845. Its Rule matured on the basis of the one devised earlier in Pavia and was approved by the archbishop of Genoa in 1856. Two Sisters started another house at Voghera in Piedmont in 1847, housing and educating young people, especially girls in danger of being forced by poverty into prostitution. This was given considerable freedom from the start and became a separate Congregation in 1905.

Bishop Tosi of Pavia died in 1851, and Benedicta was asked to go back there. She opened a school for girls and an orphanage in a former Benedictine monastery. Once more, calumny gathered force, and she was asked to leave the city and her work. On her way to another school for girls, she had a heart attack at Ronco Scrivia and died there on 21 March 1858, the feast of St Benedict, after whom she had been named. The Benedictine Sisters of Providence continue to work in Italy, Spain, and Peru. Benedicta's remains were destroyed by Allied bombing in World War II, and she was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1987.



## A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT – LUKE 13:1-8

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

In many ways, the whole of what is left of my life is a second chance. Twenty-three years ago, I was, with Eric Clapton: *Knock, knock, knocking on heaven's door*. I wasn't so much drowning in alcohol as suffocating from its vice-like grip compressing my body with its unbearable burden. If I remember correctly, it was the housewife (St) Margaret Clitheroe (1556-86) who was crushed to death under a door on which had been placed 7 or 8 hundredweight of rocks and stones until her breath had been squeezed from her body. It was a long slow death: her punishment was meted out because she was unwilling to ignore her conscience. I was subjecting my bodily organs to the same lingering destruction. My self-destruction was proving to be equally slow and was being brought about by an inability to accept life as it was, opting to vainly pursue a life that I thought I could create. Now, I awake each morning, and my overriding thoughts are no longer about remedies for a hangover and meaningless resolutions of 'never again'. Those thoughts have been replaced with euphoric feelings of gratitude: another day of promise and hope, another day full of moments that are to be savoured and cherished. I have another chance. I am presented with another day when I can adjust myself to 'what is' - instead of trying to adjust everything and everyone to my own desires. I resolve to take 'my luck' as it is and determine my life around it, rather than vice-versa. I relish my second chance.

Much of my approach to gardening revolves around giving things a second chance. I am a timid pruner but accept that pruning is essential for healthy plant growth. It gives a breather to a plant's root system, it encourages younger shoots to replace the older woody stems, it stimulates fresh green foliage – so I resolve that I will cast off all timidity and be brave. I will seize the moment. In reality, the more varied the guidebooks I read, the more confused and the more timid I become. I resolve to close my books and go with my instinct. Experience will tell me how worthwhile my instinct proves itself to be – and next year I will combine instinct and experience and then, as my second chance has almost run its course, I will have amassed my own encyclopaedia of knowledge – a tome that will rival the best of the rest. My pruning may be marked by timidity but the same could not be said of my enthusiasm for all things compost and compostable material. I love getting all dirty, mixing all manner of kitchen and garden waste, forking and turning, adding sand and bonemeal till the textures is just right – always finishing the product by hand, using hand that have grown as black as the rich, ebony-coloured loam. When it comes to compost, nothing goes to waste – and everything is given a second chance. Then I dig-in my creation, enriching the soil, bringing life and nutrition – and even teasing Lancelot the mischievous Robin who is never far from the blade of the spade as he feasts on the worms that I can see – and the tiny insects I cannot. Nothing goes to waste – and everything is given a second chance - that is, until Lancelot arrives, followed at a safer distance by Thyrza the Song Thrush and Belinda the Blackbird.

In today's Gospel we see the caretaker of a vineyard pleading with the vineyard owner on behalf of a barren fig tree. *Give me a year, let me dig round it and manure it – it may bear fruit next year. If not, then you can cut it down.* We do not know how the story ends. Were his efforts successful? Was there fruit aplenty? The point of the parable is that God will always give us the chance and opportunity to turn things around – and that, perhaps, is just as well. Few of us are blemish and fault free. *Give me a year, let me dig round it...* 

Prior to the telling of the parable Jesus has warned ...unless you repent, you will all perish as they (the Galileans) did. There is much we need to change; there is always need for repentance in our own lives, there is always need for us to be given a second chance. Doing nothing is never an option, there is always something that we can do – indeed, probably much that needs to be done. And that is why Lent is so important. There is pruning to be done, faults to be tackled and cut way, nutrients (prayer) to be dug into the soil. Like so many jobs in the garden if we take our eyes off the ball, weeds and bad habits will spot their opportunity. Lancelot, Thyrza and Belinda need us – or should that be Palestinian children, homeless refugees and the victims of the civil war raging in the Democratic Republic of Congo. They too deserve a second chance. We have been given ours – who are we to deny them theirs.? There should be urgency in our application to the task in hand. There are only four weeks of Lent left. We are experiencing and living through our second chance. Let's go for another push. Remember, doing nothing is not an option.
