



SAINT OF THE WEEK – St Gregory the Great

Pope and Doctor of the Church (540-604) – Feast Day: 3 September

"I remember with sorrow what I once was in the monastery, how I rose in contemplation above all changeable and decaying things and thought of nothing but the things of heaven But now, by reason of my pastoral care, I have to bear with secular business And when I recall the condition of my former life, I sigh as one who looks back and gazes on the shore he has left behind."



St Gregory brought to the papacy an unusual combination of managerial genius and personal holiness. While the once-glorious Roman empire fell into decay and ruin, he steered the church with a wise and steady hand, concerning himself with all matters large and small and thus establishing the church as the great stable institution of the Middle Ages.

In a sense, Gregory was born for this role. He came from a patrician Roman family that had provided two previous popes to the church. After an excellent classical education, he embarked on a career in the civil service, attaining, by the age of thirty, the office of prefect of Rome. The city was not what it had been. Sacked four times within a century, its great buildings were largely in ruins. Gregory's deft administration under these circumstances won the admiration of the entire city.

When his father died in 575 Gregory seized the opportunity to put aside "worldly" concerns. He turned his family home into a monastery and used his patrimony to establish six other monasteries. The next years were the happiest of his life. But in 579 he was called to serve the church in a

number of sensitive positions, including papal ambassador to the imperial court in Constantinople. In 590 Pope Pelagius II succumbed to an outbreak of plague, and Gregory, who was still warmly remembered by the people of Rome, was chosen as his successor. Gregory was mortified by his selection. His fondest wish had been to return to his monastery.

Reluctantly, he yielded to the call of duty. But his letters contain many poignant references to the sacrifice this entailed. Henceforth, his personal challenge was to find a balance between the inner spiritual life and the responsibilities of ecclesial office. Quickly Gregory established his leadership over the local and universal church. With the civil administration of Rome in a state of collapse he assumed de facto authority over Rome and much of Italy, responsible for meeting successive onslaughts of war, famine, and plague. At the same time he left his mark on the spiritual life of the church through his regulation of the liturgy and his promotion of plainsong choral music (later known as Gregorian chant). Probably his greatest legacies, however, were the flowering of monasticism and the successful Christian mission to England.

As the first monk to become pope, Gregory used his office to encourage and regularize the development of monasticism. His major work, **Dialogues**, which includes an entire book devoted to the life of St. Benedict did much to extend the popularity of the great father of Western monasticism.

Gregory, however, was concerned not only with consolidating the church but also with spreading the gospel. His most successful effort in this regard was the commissioning of a party of forty monks under the leadership of Augustine to bring Christianity to England. Apparently, his commitment to this project preceded his papal election. According to the story recounted by Bede, Gregory was in the marketplace in Rome one day when he noticed some fair-haired British slaves. When he asked of their nationality he was told, "They are Angles." "They are well named," he replied, "for they have angelic faces, and it becomes such to be companions with the angels in heaven." Bede documents Gregory's great personal interest in the conduct of the British mission. When Augustine's party halted in Gaul, frightened by reports of the savagery of the English, Gregory exhorted them to continue: "My very dear sons, it is better never to undertake any high enterprise than to abandon it when once begun. So with the help of God you must carry out this holy task And although my office prevents me from working at your side ... I hope to share in your joyful reward."

Augustine continued to write back for instructions, receiving replies in Gregory's own hand. Among the new bishop's questions: What exactly are the functions of a bishop? What punishment should be awarded to those

who rob churches? Is it permissible for two brothers to marry two sisters? May an expectant mother be baptized, and may a woman receive communion during her menstrual periods? On such matters as these, Augustine wrote, "These uncouth English people require guidance."

Gregory's answers reflect his characteristic wisdom, but also his humane flexibility in responding to new problems. Thus, punishing those who rob churches care must be taken to determine the motivation for the crime, whether malice or poverty. Regarding brothers who wish to marry sisters: "There is nothing in holy Scripture that seems to forbid it." As for the final questions: "Why should not an expectant mother be baptized? — it is no offence in the sight of Almighty God to bear children." And if a woman who suffered an issue of blood could touch the hem of the Lord's robe, "Why may not one who suffers nature's courses be permitted to enter the church of God?"

Bede spoke for the entire English church in paying tribute to Gregory: "For while other popes devoted themselves to building churches and enriching them with costly ornaments, Gregory's sole concern was to save souls." Though as pope he never travelled from Rome, Bede proudly claimed him as "our own apostle . . . and we are the seal of his apostleship in the Lord." In light of his many accomplishments, the church later appended the honorific title "Magnus" — the Great — to his name. Gregory himself preferred to be known as "Servant of the servants of God."

He died in 604. (On this date the church commemorates the translation of St Gregory's relics.)

A REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL FOR THE 22nd SUNDAY OF THE YEAR – LUKE 14:1, 7-14

(The author of this reflection is a friend of Fr Jock who lives in Northumberland)

Thursday proved to be interesting, to say the least. In deepest leafy Surrey, a funeral Mass took place for my third eldest sister, Liz. For reasons that are too painful and complicated to explain, it was deemed better if I stayed in the North-East of England and kept my second eldest sister, Anne, company in Holy Cross Care Home where she is living after a Stroke.. We would follow proceedings via an internet link. At least that was the plan! iPad fully charged, latest software uploaded, I clicked on the link to be somewhat unhelpfully informed 'You do not have access to this video'. Every addict and alcoholic I have ever met, including myself, has spent a great deal of their lives convincing themselves that next time it will be better: that the high they are chasing will be as good as the first way back when Moses was in short trousers. I reloaded the link. Again, and again! Each time, I expected a different, successful outcome. Each time I was informed: 'You do not have access to this video.' I remembered the hangovers, the frustrations of the after-effects of an alcoholic binge – but I kept searching for the success I craved, a hangover-free existence! There was no point trying to contact any of the mourners in leafy Surrey. They'd probably have their 'phones off, or at least they should have had them so. Time for Plan B. Google produced the number for the Diocesan office of Arundel and Brighton, and I explained the situation to a helpful lady who answered the telephone. After an eternity 'on hold' she eventually came up trumps (but not THAT Trump) and sent me a new link. Bingo – or so I thought. I was able to follow the Mass on my iPhone but when I attempted to share the link to Anne's iPad, I was again informed: 'You do not have access to this video'. Give me strength!. All we want to do is watch a Funeral Mass. How come it was so easy to hack into the Marks and Spencer Computer system? When it comes to operational matters, YouTube could teach MI5 and the MOD a thing or two. All my technical know-how was as naught when confronted by the behemoth of YouTube technology, which seems all too often to be aware of what I'm thinking, even before I am. How come it didn't know that, like a good Catholic, I just wanted a Requiem Mass! So, my sister and I watched the Funeral Mass on the comparatively tiny screen of my iPhone with the volume on its highest setting. All in all, it was an experience equal in frustration and humility.

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus has some advice: Be humble. As a piece of direction, it's not complicated. Likewise, as a tool in the armoury of life, humility is often overlooked and bizarrely, confused with weakness. Too many people fail to grasp this simple lesson. Humility is NOT weakness. A lot of our so-called political leaders certainly don't seem sufficiently intelligent to grasp this concept. One of them is apparently thinking about his chances of getting into heaven. Someone, anyone, should whisper into his shell-like ear and advise: Humility - then for their own safety stand well back!

In today's Gospel passage Jesus uses a parable to teach about the importance of humility. Don't take the place of honour - sit lower down in case someone more important than you has been invited. It will be much better if we're invited to move higher than asked to sit lower down the table. He goes on: and when you throw a party don't invite those who will be expected to repay your hospitality - instead invite those who cannot repay you. In other words, practice humility in all of your affairs. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted. As a piece of advice, it needs to be taken alongside all of the other parables and not taken in isolation. As with all things in life it's about balance. We strive to identify our individual talents and gifts, but only so that we can give them and share them with others: they are there primarily for the benefit of society and the community not for our own bank balance.

Humility is about the truth. It is rooted in the recognition that important though I think I am, I am not as important or talented as I thought I was. Humility involves accepting the reality of who we are; the reality of who we are is only discovered when we make that journey inwards. Humility means we work with what we have. What we have is ourselves. It's a humbling journey – but a rewarding one. I wasn't prepared to let technological glitches get in our way. There is always a work-around. We just have to look for it. Peace of mind and humility walk hand in hand. When we recognise and accept the truth of who we are and where we are, then it is very easy to be humble. When we are free of self-delusion, then we see reality. And on that day we will, indeed, learn to be truly humble - and, dare I say, we will be truly happy and enjoy peace of mind.
